STATEMENT ON MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

GERMANY RAISES BITTER PROTEST TODAY

Four Power Proposals Described in Berlin As "Blow Below Belt"

Pledges of Mutual Assistance May Have Far-Reaching Effect—Britain Would Hear Hitler Plan

BERLIN, March 21: (CP)—Germany raised a bitter protest today against the decisions of other Locarno nations to settle the Rhineland crisis, the four power proposals of Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium falling into Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's camp with a completely unexpected thud. The press charged that Hitler had been dealt a "blow below the belt," declaring that British and Italian assurances of support to France and Belgium in case Germany declined to accept the four-power plan carried the possibility of far-reaching consequences.

CITY ACT ALTERED

Minister of Finance Given Authority to Reinvest Securities of Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, March 21: (CP)—An amendment to the City of Prince Rupert Refunding Act 1935 which has been introduced in the Legislature will give the minister of finance authority to reinvest securities held in the sinking funds of the city of Prince Rupert. As the act now stands the minister may invest "monies" but not securities. The amendment will permit the purchasing of bonds when it is deemed advantageous.

Bill to Overhaul Civil Service Is Beaten at Ottawa

OTTAWA, March 21: (CP)—The overhaul bill to overhaul the Civil Service Act was defeated in the House of Commons last night after Premier W. L. Mackenzie King had pledged the government to establish a special commission next session to review the whole legislation.

ITALO-ETHIOPIAN PEACE TERMS ARE COMING UP AGAIN

GENEVA, March 21:—With at least a temporary lull in the crisis following Germany's military re-occupation of the Rhineland, the Italo-Ethiopian war returns to the limelight of international affairs today with the League of Nations committee of thirteen scheduled to meet to consider replies of Italy and Ethiopia to peace proposals in the East African conflict. The council of the League is to meet on Monday.

LAMSON JURY DELIBERATES

Lamson, former Stanford University executive, taking fourth trial on a charge of murdering his wife, was still undecided last night so was locked up for the night. Cities Under Control Of Government Not To Get Autonomy in 1936

Nor is City of Vancouver to Get Big Loan it Has Banked On—Proposal Made For Refunding of Debts At Lower Interest Rate

VICTORIA, March 21: (CP)—Vancouver will not receive \$1,790,000 from the province to balance its budget this year, as anticipated by that city, nor will cities now under provincial control have their autonomy restored at an early date, declared Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipal affairs, in the Legislature yesterday. He announced a plan whereby the cities of Victoria and Vancouver would be invited to call in their bondholders and refund their debts without provincial aid. The plan was to extend bonded indebtedness on a twentyfive year basis at 3 1/2% interest, using present sinking funds as a basis for retirement of consolidated debt.
