Bondholders Decide That Province Could Without Difficulty Pay Full Interest Rates

EDMONTON, Oct. 2: (CP)-Alberta is economically solvent and able to meet interest obligations in full, a committee of bondholders advised Premier William Aberhart today.

The committee, after weeks of investigating Alberta's finances. has decided the government is not justified in slashing interest charges to an average of about three percent.

It is stated by the committee that interest charges could have been paid this year and the province would have recorded a budget deficit of only \$192,216.
