NUREMBERG, Sept. 12: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf tler, with hundreds of war planes roaring overhead, declared today that Germany would be overwhelmingly prosperous "if we had the rich agricultural lands and ore-laden mountains of Russia." He asserted that Gernany would triumph over Russia "if the hour ever comes when there is a war." If I had the Urals, if we possessed Siberia, the Ukraine, Germany would be swimming in surplus prosperity. I am not in the fortunate position of Soviet Jews. Germany's problem must be solved."


