

LOCAL NEWS NOTES

Tonight's train, due from the East at 10:20, was reported this morning to be on time.

Lieutenant Commander F. R. Gow R. C. N., after a brief visit here, sails this afternoon by the Catala on his return to Esquimaux.

A delegation representing local unemployed and labor organizations is meeting City Commissioner W. J. Alder this afternoon seeking an increase in the local relief allowance.

James Lamb, manager of Casiar cannery, and Mrs. Lamb, who have been spending the winter in Vancouver, are expected to arrive on the Skeena River from the south at the end of this week to spend the summer.

The fire department was called at 1:30 yesterday afternoon to a grass fire at Sixth Avenue and Young Street. Last night at 8:35 there was a brush fire at Ninth Avenue and Dunsmuir Street. There was no damage in either case.

Proceeds as a result of Queen Mary Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire tagging last Saturday for the fund for beautification of soldiers' graves are announced to have been very satisfactory, exceeding expectations.

Mrs. H. Andre of San Francisco is spending a few days here visiting with Mrs. W. L. Coates and will be leaving Thursday morning on the Princess Norah for Juneau where she formerly resided and where she will visit with old friends.

Brigadier W. L. Carruthers, divisional commander of the Salvation Army from Wrangell, who is on a tour of this district, and Adjutant Eva Laycock, local commandant, returned to the city on the Catala today after spending the week-end at Port Simpson.

H. F. McLeod, who has been a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital for several weeks suffering from a dislocated shoulder sustained in a fall, was sufficiently recovered to be able to leave hospital yesterday afternoon. The arm, however, is still in a sling.

Miss Evelyn Mitchell of Toronto, travelling secretary of the Women's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada, who is on a western tour, arrived in the city on the Catala today from Port Simpson, where she spent yesterday, and will proceed by train from here tomorrow night to Burns Lake, Prince George, Kamloops and other interior points. She will speak in the local United Church tonight.

Charged with obstructing a peace officer, Graham Fleming was further remanded for eight days in city police court this morning.

Wilson-Murray Is B.-I. Speaker

Gave Impromptu Talk at Meeting Last Night

In the absence of the scheduled speaker, W. H. Wilson-Murray gave an impromptu talk at the meeting of the British-Israel Society held in the Toc H Rooms last evening with President P. H. Linzey in the chair. Starting with the League of Nations formed soon after the Armistice, Mr. Wilson-Murray traced the many alliances made by the various countries in Europe. Britain's efforts to maintain peace in the world, the political situation in Europe in relation to the prophecies in Ezekiel and the secret arming of Germany and other continental powers were described.

The speaker took his listeners to the Gondar region and Lake Tana in Ethiopia and Egypt, with cotton crops which meant so much to the north of England, the Nile and its possibilities and problems and, through it all, Israel-Britain holding the balance of power in watchful waiting. Touching also on the unrest in Japan and China, the speaker showed how one unfriendly act might involve every other nation by reason of pacts and agreements.

An animated discussion followed among those present, many stressed the power of prayer and God's promise to aid His People when enquired of.
