The funeral service for the late King will be led by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. Practically every nation in the world will be represented at the funeral by prominent personages to pay final tribute to the dead monarch who was so highly and widely esteemed.

## AND NOW THE DUKE IS KING OF POLAND Senate Joins House In Overriding Veto By Decisive Margin

Division in Upper House Today Was 76 to 19-Will Put Over Two Billion Dollars Into Circulation

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 27: (CP)-Immediate payment of the soldiers' bonus was made law by the United States Congress today when the Senate voted 79 to 19 to override the presidential veto of last week. The House of Representatives had previously voted the veto down 324 to 61. The payment of the bonus will be financed by the issue of special bonds. As a result over two billion dollars will be put into circulation.
