## WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Having been delayed at Wales  
Island where she had cans to dis-  
charge and canned salmon to load,  
Union steamer Catala, Capt. James  
Findlay, arrived in port at 11 o'-  
clock last night from Stewart, An-  
yox and other northern points and  
sailed a couple of hours later for  
Vancouver and waypoints.

Prices were slightly higher again  
on the Seattle Fish Exchange yes-  
terday when eight halibut boats  
sold catches totalling 154,000  
pounds. Western fish was paid 9c  
and 7 1/2c and local fish 9 3/4c and  
8 1/2c. Cod was paid 3c per pound  
and sablefish, 3 1/2c.

The Seattle trolling boat May,  
reported sunk off Cape Flattery,  
was seized off Massett at the same  
time the Catherine B., now on the  
Digby Island ferry run, was taken  
several years ago. Two years later  
she was seized again near Goose  
Island and in each case was tied  
up here for some time.

With a capacity list of round trip  
tourists for Alaska, C. N. R. steamer  
Prince George, Capt. H. E. Neddin,  
arrived in port at 9:45 this morning  
from the south and sailed north at  
1 o'clock this afternoon.

C. N. R. steamer Prince Charles,  
Capt. Dan McKinnon, is in Mas-  
sett Inlet today and is due tomor-  
row morning from Vancouver via  
the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The Alaskan freighter Evelyn,  
Berg arrived in port at 10 o'clock  
this morning from Ketchikan and  
after discharging one carload of  
fresh fish for transshipment East  
over Canadian National Railways,  
sailed on continuation of her voy-  
age to Seattle.

With an Alaska Southern Air-  
ways seaplane, Pilot Bob Ellis, well  
known northern commercial flier  
arrived here at 7:30 this morning  
from Ketchikan and left at 8:10  
a.m. on his return north. Pilot  
Ellis brought in a passenger who  
will be proceeding East by rail  
from here this evening.

On its way back to Vancouver af-  
ter a flight to Dease Lake with a  
mining party, the Air Travel and  
Transport Waco seaplane piloted by  
Capt. E. C. W. Dobbin arrived here  
at 12 noon today and, after refuel-  
ing up, continued south at 2 p.m.  
picking up Capt. Paul Armour here  
for Vancouver.

## CONNELL ASSERTS THAT COM- MUNIST RUMP IS IN CHARGE OF C. C. F. IN PROVINCE; TEL- FORD "DICTATOR"

form committee. Had his views  
and criticism in fact been desired  
he would have been placed there  
as a matter of course. As parlia-  
mentary leader he has to explain  
and justify in Parliament and on  
the platform the policy of the  
party. His platform, which has  
the support of the vast majority  
of the 90,000 C.C.F. voters, came  
before this committee as well as  
Dr. Telford's platform and the  
Burrard campaign platform. Dr.  
Telford and his friends, Blenday  
and Stephens, were on the com-  
mittee to support his platform and  
Arnold Webster to support the  
Burrard platform, and three other  
delegates.

But Mr. Connell was deliberately  
excluded and his platform was re-  
jected by Dr. Telford and his  
friends behind closed doors with-  
out a hearing, thereby denying  
him the right to defend it and the  
opportunity of criticizing the de-  
fects in the alternative platform  
at the only time and place where  
such criticism could be of any  
practical use. It is consequently  
thoroughly humbug to suggest to  
the public that the executive  
"regrets" that Mr. Connell did  
not engage in open warfare with  
Dr. Telford on the floor of the  
convention.

"Preposterous Proposal"  
And now these men who "sab-  
otaged" a sound and sane plat-  
form and rushed through their  
own, which is largely impractic-  
able and ultra vires in its  
economics positively insane, have  
the effrontery to charge "their  
ablest, finest leader and most ap-  
pealing personality" with attempt-  
ing to "dictate the course of the  
movement according to his own  
personal ideas," simply because he  
has stated that he cannot honest-  
ly support a platform of this  
nature, which is in fact a fraud  
on the electorate.

This suggestion involves the im-  
pudent claim that Mr. Connell  
and the rest of us are bound to  
support an irrational dogma,  
which Dr. Telford and his sup-  
porters are unable to explain, one  
that has been condemned by all  
competent economists, living or  
dead, and by every member of  
the C.C.F. who has any grasp of  
the elementary principles of ec-  
onomics.

Dr. Telford stated it would have  
to be worked out by a trained  
economist, but no economist would  
in fact father such a proposal.

The charge of "dictatorship" re-  
coils on the head of the man who  
made it.  
Who controls C. C. F. propaganda  
over the radio? Dr. Telford.  
Who also desires to control the  
press by obtaining possession of  
the only independent Socialist  
paper in the province that main-  
tained an open forum for free  
speech and discussion? If that  
happened, Dr. Telford, by con-  
trolling all organs of propaganda  
would be able to silence criticism  
and mold opinion as completely as  
any Mussolini.

Members Under Control  
Who again controls the members  
we elect to represent us in Parlia-  
ment? All candidates are required  
to pledge that they "will resign  
the seat on the order of the prov-  
incial convention." This is, of  
course, illegal.

If the unhappy member wishes  
to address his constituents he  
must realize that "he is under  
control of the speakers' com-  
mittee of the provincial executive."  
He must "attend the speakers'  
conference held at headquarters."  
If he fails to do so for "three suc-  
cessive meetings" his name shall  
be removed from the official  
speakers' list. He cannot arrange  
any "meetings" or "tours" without  
the consent of the speakers' com-  
mittee.

Moreover, the clubs must report  
as to "the presentation, effect and  
nature of the address" of such  
speaker. Further, "all parliamen-  
tary representatives are required to  
present a quarterly report to the  
provincial executive and their dis-  
trict council," and are "at all  
times subject to the authority of  
the executive," and the so-called  
leader can be removed at any time  
by the executive, and is thereby  
on constitutional principle dis-  
qualified from holding the position  
of Premier or Leader of the Op-  
position.

Who forms his cabinet? The  
minister cannot follow the law of  
the constitution and select the  
men with whose aid he feels he  
can carry on the government. Dr.

Telford and his executive have  
complete "control."  
What about finance? The mem-  
bers of the C.C.F. are requested  
to purchase "plenty for all" gro-  
ceries from Dr. Telford, who con-  
trols the profits.

And what about the unhappy  
taxpayer? The executive stated in  
its bulletin: "As a proletarian  
movement, we are not particularly  
concerned with protecting the in-  
terests of taxpayers. It is probable  
on the contrary, that added pres-  
sure on the taxpayer would ulti-  
mately result in strengthening  
our cause by bringing about in-  
tolerable conditions at an in-  
creased speed."

Moreover, "the C.C.F. labor code  
is to be enacted before the closing  
of the first C.C.F. legislative ses-  
sion." "All physically unfit per-  
sons are to labor" and it is de-  
clared to be "society's right to  
compel them to do so." We are all  
to be "registered" and "aligned in  
categories." "No person registered  
shall refuse to work" and disci-  
plinary action "is to be taken  
against us 'if we fail to conform  
to decisions.'"

In other words, we have only  
to vote the C.C.F. into office and  
we shall all of us be, Premier and  
Cabinet included, completely un-  
der the thumb of Dr. Telford.

Yet in truth, he and his execu-  
tive merely represent the Com-  
munist wing of the C.C.F. clubs,  
whose total membership is only  
about 3 percent of the 90,000  
voters in B.C. who supported so-  
cialism at the federal election. Most  
of the electors are outside of these  
clubs, because, as Guy Shep-  
pard proved, they are centres of  
Communist propaganda, and near-  
ly all such voters are, like Mr.  
Connell, supporters of the Regina  
Manifesto, which plainly excludes  
the "class war" and "proletarian  
revolution" of the Marxists.

And now that the provincial ex-  
ecutive has endorsed Marxian  
Socialism, it is impossible for those  
of us who are loyal to the creed  
of the party to be associated with  
this insignificant Communist  
rump, which the executive, in  
flagrant disregard of the truth
