### Go Ahead With Post Office

It is very satisfactory news that the post office is to be erected on the old provincial government block in this city and that tenders will be called for the work almost immediately. If the foundations digging starts early in the new year it will give a number of men remunerative work and will help us through the slack period when work is particularly appreciated.

### Utilizing the Port

Utilizing the port of Prince Rupert with a view to making this section of the railway pay its way is one of the problems now before the administration at Ottawa and the railway heads at Montreal. There has been a lot of howling about the railway and suggestions have been made that the Dominion should be relieved of the necessity of meeting the annual losses on the line and yet, so far as anyone could see or hear, no attempt had ever been made to develop shipping business by way of Prince Rupert except to build the elevator and allow it to be used as a storage house by the Wheat Pool.

The C. P. R. president has evidently seen possibilities in the C. N. R. and has been urging the country to consolidate the system with the C. P. R. in order to save money for the country. It has been stated that, if the C. P. R. had the railway, Prince Rupert would soon be developed into a real port and would have double its present population. That, of course, is only conjecture. What is evident is that no real effort has ever been made to develop the business of the port.

Now, it is suggested, there is to be a change of policy. We sincerely hope there is. For a city at the terminus of a railway in such a country as this to remain practically stagnant for twenty years is one of the most stinging indictments against the C. N. R. management of past years that can be brought forward.

However, recriminations are useless. What we have to do is look forward. Plans were laid for the further development of the tourist traffic over the road during the past season but the disastrous floods in the early summer nipped the effort in the bud. By the time the road was in shape, the season was gone. At any rate, it was a gesture indicating interest in this end of the road. Now Mr. Nickerson brings word that other developments may be expected. Everyone will be glad to hear it. Prince Rupert will co-operate to the fullest extent, we feel sure, and will back any movement that seems likely to improve the situation.

## NEW RULES LAID DOWN

Amended Regulations in Regard To Use of Intermediate Hoop Players in Senior Loop

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Basketball Association following last night's league games, the following amended regulations in regard to use of players in the various leagues were adopted after some discussion:

The executive will have full power to promote or demote players in any league as it sees fit for the betterment of play.

Senior teams can call on two intermediate players for four games in any one season but any intermediate player used in five senior games automatically becomes a senior.

No senior team shall call upon an intermediate player for a fifth game unless it guarantees to give that player a reasonable amount of play.

W. F. Stone, president of the league, was in the chair and there were about seventy-five players and fans present including S. D. Macdonald, the honorary vice-president, who made a speech.
