

Waterfront Whiffs

Salmon Scarce But All Canneries Still In Operation—Only Four Halibut Boats Land Catches During Entire Week

While not a great many fish have been available during the past week, no salmon canneries in Prince Rupert district had finally ended packing operations up to this weekend although it is expected that next week will see a number close down. There has been a very definite falling off in the run during the last few days and the closing down of certain fishing areas to fishing in order to ensure escapement to the spawning grounds has further accentuated the scarcity of fish.

The run of pinks in Massett Inlet is not up to the expectations of the cycle year although a satisfactory number of fish are reported in the streams.

Butedale area, with the exception of the west coast of Banks Island, was closed to seining during the past week until further notice as well as all net fishing in the Lowe Inlet area. There has been a heavy run of pinks in both Butedale and Lowe Inlet areas this year. The streams, however, have become low and the fishing has been closed in order to give a chance to get into the spawning beds.

With water low and clear and weather bright and sunny late August sees gill netters on both Skeena and Naas Rivers getting light catches of cohoes.

During the past week only four halibut boats sold catches aggregating 103,000 pounds at Prince Rupert. There was only one Canadian boat, the Takla, which landed 42,000 pounds and received the very substantial price of 11.4c and 7c. Three American boats brought 61,000 pounds, the Rainier and Viking being paid 10.2c and 6c for 26,000 and 13,000 pounds respectively and the President 10.7c and 6c for 22,000 pounds. Landings for the season up to yesterday reached an aggregate of 8,244,200 pounds as against 8,511,450 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The Canadian total is 4,656,500 pounds in comparison with 4,140,150 pounds a year ago.

No boats being in with catches, there was no sale of halibut on the local Fish Exchange this morning.
