Pacific Great Eastern Sale To One of Transcontinental Lines is Again Talked About

OTTAWA, April 24: (CP)—Sale of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to the Canadian National or the Canadian Pacific Railway is proposed by the British Columbia government, it was stated yesterday in a news page story in the Toronto Globe. The sale would be made for replacement value which, the article stated, was claimed to be \$35,000,000.

"The railway runs from Howe Sound, thirty miles from Vancouver, to Quesnel, seventy miles from Prince George, at which point the Pacific Great Eastern planned to link up with the Grand Trunk Pacific," the article concludes.
