After all they do not amount to much for the country invaded is not very important and the war activities are confined to a comparatively small area. Of late, however, there has been brisk fighting as strenuous efforts have been made to force the Italian advances in order to make some showing before the rainy season commences.

Famous Hyde Collection of Indian Curios is Formally Conveyed To Museum Board by Administrator

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Museum Board held in the office of Dr. J. T. Mandy at the Court House yesterday afternoon, the famous Hyde collection of Indian curios was formally handed over to the safe keeping of the museum in a letter from the official administrator and arrangements were made for it to be moved from the Canadian National Railway freight sheds where it now lies, to the museum room over the library.

The collection, which is contained in seven cases, arrived in the city a few days ago. It had been taken south for safe keeping several years ago and was placed in charge of the provincial museum authorities by whom it has been classified. It is looked upon as a very valuable collection and the curator of the museum at Victoria was loath to part with it.

Just as soon as cases for its display have been prepared, the collection will be arranged and opened for the public to see. Also a custodian will be appointed just as soon as funds are raised with which to pay him. It is hoped to get a pensioner or some person not dependent on this work for a living who will look after the museum during the time it is open to the public and be responsible for the articles displayed there.

In connection with the fitting up of the museum the Board expects to get a grant of possibly \$1500 from the Carnegie fund, further steps having been taken at a meeting yesterday toward the securing of this. This money will not, however, be available for maintenance.

Dr. Neal Carter reported on an interview with H. O. McCurry, secretary of the Canadian committee handling the Carnegie fund at Ottawa. The only thing standing in the way of securing the grant it was shown, was the desire of the committee to get some assurance of the continuity of the museum: such as the passing of a city bylaw. This was placed before Commissioner W. J. Alder with a request for action and is now before the city solicitor.

Question of Financing

The question of financing was discussed by the board at some length and possible means of raising the money required were talked over. The matter is now in the hands of a committee and the secretary who will recommend a line of action. The city provides the room in the library building together with light and heat so there will be very little money to raise over and above the honorarium to be paid to the custodian and the incidental expenses attendant upon moving and mounting specimens.

A request has been sent to the Department of Mines at Victoria asking it to provide cases in which to exhibit the mineral collection donated by Dr. J. T. Mandy. If this is not done, the Board will have to be responsible for the cases.

Three show cases were received from a member of the board as a donation and are being removed to the building. This will make four cases already available. It is now possible that someone else may have a spare case which might be donated for the same purpose thus enabling the work of displaying the collection to proceed. Anyone having natural history specimens or Indian curios they do not need might also donate them.
