## SALMON CANNING INDUSTRY

Almost next door to Prince Rupert are located twenty or more salmon canneries most of which are operated with a total disregard to the presence of this city close to them Ha and also without regard to the fact that this is an industry that might give employment to a great many Canadian young people. The chief benefit to the district from these canneries is that they give employment to a great many resident native people—men, women and children—and to a few white fishermen living in the neighborhood. Most of the canners bring in all their supplies from the south, ship their product south to be labelled and distributed and act in every way as if they had a natural right to the City Billiard fish without owing anything to the district where they are caught.

For years the businessmen of Prince Rupert tried to induce the canners to do the right thing by this city. At one time the Sunnyside cannery bought a good deal of supplies in the city and for one season only the B. C. Packers established a purchasing agent in Prince Rupert. Last fall the Canadian Fishing Company decided to distribute a large part of its catch from Prince Rupert and the Inverness cannery does much of its labelling and distributing direct from the cannery at the mouth of the Canadian Legion Clubrooms by next sociation's inter-club competition Skeena.
