CONDITION IN SPAIN

Undoubtedly there is a conation in Spain which is not only the cause of terrible disaster in that country but a danger to the whole world as it may be the spark which may bring about the war for which many people have been looking. While we are still inclined to the idea that there will be no European war this year, we are bound to acknowledge that there is grave danger of such a catastrophe.

WHAT DID HE MEAN?

In his London Letter in the latest issue of Maclean's, Beverley Baxter, journalist and politician, who paid a flying visit to the Governor General in Ottawa when he came over on the first voyage of the Queen Mary and returned on the same vessel, made a rather remarkable statement. Speaking of the much quoted suggestion that Canada should be an interpreter between America and England, he said: "Canada must be more than an interpreter. She must be a partner, perhaps some day the dominating partner in the union of kindred nations that speak the common tongue of England."

Evidently Mr. Baxter sees serious and intensely interesting happenings ahead, happenings which will affect this country and our neighbors.

BRITAIN'S POSITION

Again let us look at what this man Beverley Baxter says, quoting from the same article: "There are men in Germany—not all men—who have the spirit of the jungle and the soul of beasts. There are men in Italy who believe that by foul death inflicted upon defenceless people a happier world may be created for Italians. There are men in France ready to mount the barricades in the name of communism, and there are men in France ready to die against those barricades in the name of fascism. Fear, hatred, suspicion, greed and despair stalk like spectres across the continent of Europe. And, divided by a little silver channel that now means nothing, lies Britain. By day and by night her government strives for the settlement of Europe's problems. By day and by night the civilizing influence of the British people moves toward Europe like a cooling breeze after the heat of the day. Do not imagine that Britain's task is for herself alone. It is for you in Canada. It is for the men and women in New York and California. Let the civilization of Europe sink into anarchy or be plunged into despotism, and the plague will find its way across the seas and through any barriers. These are fateful days for Canada and the United States of America."

Skeena River Canneries Are Very Busy—Log Boat Starts Loading Tomorrow—Found New Trout Lake.

With a large run of sockeye still continuing for the gillnetters and pinks beginning to move in from the seiners, Skeena River canneries are working to capacity these days. Indeed, they are operating almost night and day to handle the fish.

The big British freighter Stonegate, which arrived in port yesterday from the Orient to load 600,000 feet of cottonwood timber from the Skeena River district for China, had an uneventful voyage from Muroran, Japan, which port she left on July 9. Loading of the Stonegate will start tomorrow. She will proceed from here to the southern mainland to complete.

kial says 'I will lay my vengeance on Edom by the hand of Israel.' This heartless, cruel nation has been punished.

Troublous Days
"The days in which we live are indeed distressful and chaotic," continued Mr. Linzey. "The very air seemed charged with agitation and fear. The Bible predicted that these nations would attempt to do with the Euphrates Valley and Palestine what Italy had done to Ethiopia. The dictators of Europe who are building up gigantic war machines have an eye on the middle east and have hitherto only been held in check by fear of the League and the power of the British Empire. The Abyssinian affair has largely disillusioned them and they see an abortive League and a pacifist Britain advocating peace and disarmament. Therefore they argue what Germany attempted in the last war and failed to do could be achieved under present conditions. These aggressive nations imagine Britain to be asleep and they are debating in their chancelleries the acquisition of this coveted prize. This is the stage which is being set and the curtain will soon rise on the great battle of the nations."
Concluding the speaker said: "Britain is wise in arming for defensive purposes, an armed Britain will tend to segregate a worldwide war to a definite confined sphere but unarmed would lay the world open to a more deadly scale of world wide proportions."
