## SMITHERS

The Smithers District Chamber of Commerce, at its December meeting, voted approval of the Hornby plan of farm settlement. It is hoped that, as a result, many new settlers may be brought from the British Isles to populate vacant lands of the Bulkley Valley.

The annual meeting of the Smithers Fall Fair Board was held in Smithers last Friday night. Business included the presentation of reports and election of officers.

Karson Hanson and Harry Orm of Smithers have been awarded a contract to drive two hundred feet of tunnel on the Dardanelles group of claims on Copper River near Terrace for the Omineca Gold Quartz Mines Ltd. The work will probably be carried out next year.

Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth of Prince Rupert has been a recent visitor to Smithers in the course of his Presbyterian Church survey work.

Visiting New Hazelton at the first of last week, Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, said that he hoped to soon get new orders lined up which would enable him to open some new pole camps in the interior. At present shipments are being made from various points along the Canadian National Railways. Mr. Hanson is at present on a trip to Vancouver on business in connection with some prospective new pole and piling contracts.

New Hazelton operators are again talking about taking out a large quantity of cottonwood and poplar logs for shipment to the Orient by way of Prince Rupert. A more favorable freight rate to Prince Rupert is being sought and here is said to be hope of this being obtained. Gust Christiansen of New Hazelton has already gone into the woods to cut roads through his timber limits back of the town. He will be ready for work as soon as the frost and snow comes providing the orders materialize.

## Trade Mark Was Upheld in Court

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—The Bayer Co. Ltd. of Windsor, Ontario, has been granted judgment of the Exchequer Court of Canada against Max Beyer of Winnipeg, Manitoba. The Bayer Company alleged that the defendant, Max Beyer, was infringing its registered trade mark "Aspirin" by applying same to tablets which were not the Bayer Co.'s product, and the judgment of the Exchequer Court perpetually restrains the defendant, Max Beyer, from selling or distributing products not manufactured by the Bayer Company as Aspirin and directs Max Beyer to deliver up all containers, labels or other matter offending against the judgment. The defendant is also required to pay the Bayer Company damages and the costs of the court action.
