One of Prince Rupert's best citizens is leaving within Baseball Standings a few days to reside in Victoria. C. H. Orme, better known] to his intimate friends as "Doc," has lived in Prince Rupert since the opening up of the townsite. He was little; more than a lad when he came here a quarter of a century ago. He then went into the drug business and he is still dispensing but, whereas he opened in a tent, he now owns a substantial store that would be a credit to any town.

During his residence in Prince Rupert Mr. Orme has served on almost every public body but his three years as mayor were probably the most strenuous of his career.
