

WINDFALL FOR A SPOKANE MAN

Little Deed of Kindness to a Miner Several Years Ago Brings a \$84,000 Legacy.

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 23.—Word received here last night from Spokane is that F. B. Knapp, to whom Thomas B. Lynch, who is said to be dying in an Alaskan hospital, has bequeathed a fortune of \$84,000 for his kindness shown to him several years ago, is now employed as a motorman for the Inland electric system. R. S. Knapp, father of the motorman, who also was named as beneficiary, has been dead for nine years. A letter recently was received by a local paper asking that it locate F. B. Knapp and his father, R. S. Knapp, that the money might be sent to them. In the message received last night, F. B. Knapp tells the following story:

"My father and I lived near Ferris, Minn., in the winter of 1898. One day Lynch was brought in from the woods a very sick man. I took him to my home, as there was no hospital, and I rode to Graceland, a small town, to get some medicine. We nursed for a while, and when he got well he went away. I never heard anything more from him. I suppose he appreciated our attention."

WANDERERS' CLUB DANCE

Bright and Successful Early Season Event in the McIntyre Hall Last Night.

To the record of successful dances held in the McIntyre Hall there must be added one which though so early in the season will not be easily surpassed. There must have been nearly a hundred couples present, and with the dance in full swing the floor was a maze of brightness and color. The full glory of the feminine frock from the simplest to the most strikingly effective design was radiantly displayed. The dance programme included a set of lancers which proved extremely popular. Gray's orchestra supplied the music to the evident appreciation of the dancers, and there was an abundantly lavish refreshment service during the intervals, and at midnight when dancing ceased for the regular supper interval. Beyond doubt the Wanderers are to be congratulated on the success of their dance. They have set the pace for Prince Rupert's festive occasions this season, and set it high.

SINGING PICTURES

Recent Success of an English Inventor with Musical Cinematograph.

A new stage in the development of the cinematograph was marked by a recent performance at the Kensington Picture Palace, where the Ipsium Synchroniser was first displayed in public. This invention is a highly successful effort to present a speaking, or singing picture, this being arranged by the simultaneous working of the cinematograph and the gramophone. The whole point of the exhibition was to show the progress towards perfect synchronization in the public representation.

A picture of a woman was displayed on the screen, and, after a few seconds, the gramophone gave out the words of the popular song, "Now I've got to call him father." The movements of the mouth showed the pronunciation of each word; perfect time was kept, and the audience was impressed with the idea that the film and the voice record must have been made at the same time. As a matter of fact, this was not the case, though when more ambitious displays, such as picture plays with several actors and actresses, are introduced, it will, of course, be necessary.

It seems safe to prophesy that the time is not far distant when every picture palace will have to adopt this or some similar method of satisfying the ears as well as the eyes of the audience. The exhibition at Kensington shows that the experimental stage has been passed, but the invention is as yet in its infancy, and the actors and actresses of the present generation need have no fear of being forced to retire, like the cab-horse owing to the motor car. The quivering of the picture on the sheet is still trying to the eye, and the sound metallic of the gramophone is a poor substitute for the human voice.

It would, by the way, have been better had Mr. Donisthorpe and those responsible for the exhibition secured a better record for the song, for its grating noise was distinctly displeasing. This, however, was only a matter of secondary importance, since it was a primary necessity to show how sound and motion could be reproduced so as to synchronize accurately with one another. This great aim has been attained. Mr. Donisthorpe is to be congratulated on his all-British invention, which has been actually seen in London, whilst Mr. Edison's invention on the same lines has been only discussed.

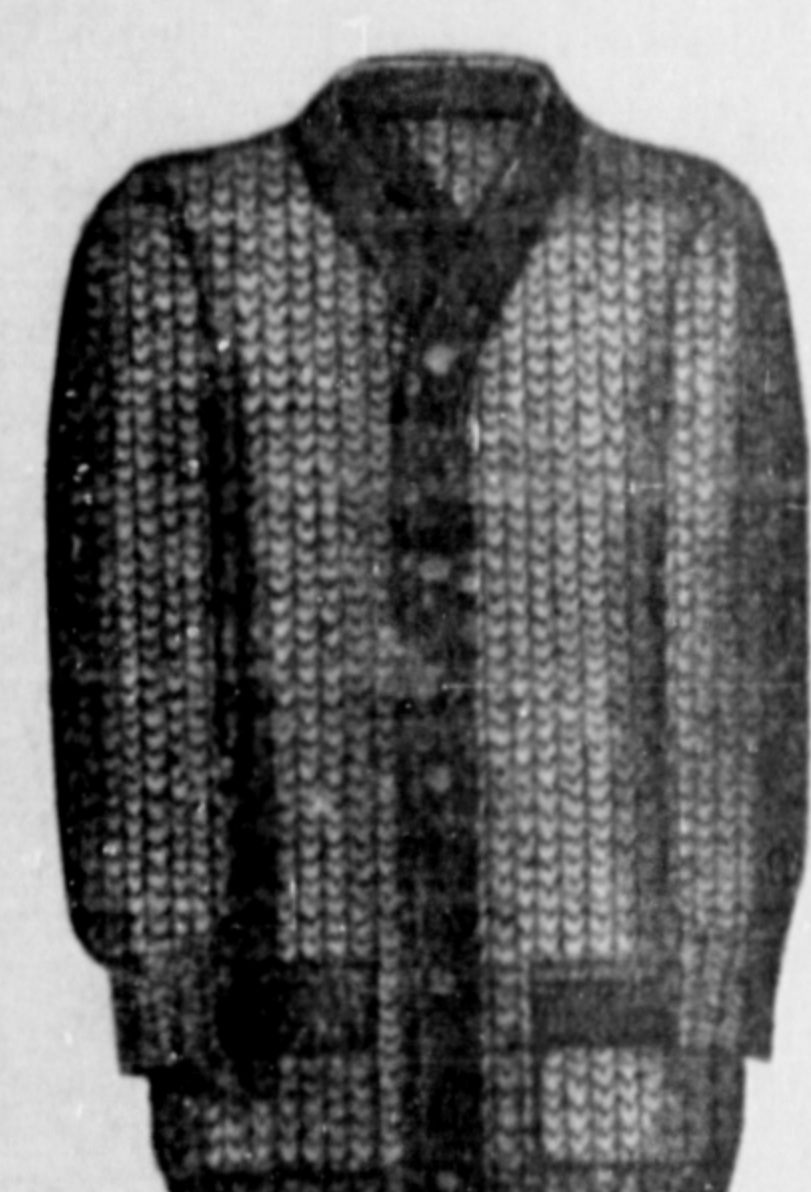
