A New Hospital

A special grant is being made by the Legislature at the instance of the member for the district, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, toward the erection of a new hospital in Prince-Rupert. This is a good beginning. The hospital board already has the nucleus of a fund for the same purpose and it is possible that a further grant may be made later if the money is needed, as it undoubtedly will be.

When the Premier was in Prince Rupert, the matter was taken up with him by members of the hospital board and he was very appreciative of the need at that time. While the city has no money for this purpose and cannot borrow unless it might be from the provincial government, it is expected that the money will be raised and that it will be only a short time before the hospital will be erected. The preliminary step was the voting of the amount necessary to commence the work.
