

Asselstine, member for Atlin, for having secured the vote of \$25,000 for an ore sampling mill at Prince Rupert to serve not only his district but also the points along the railway where mining is carried on. It would serve the Portland Canal area, Queen Charlottes, Porcher Island and also the interior and it has been generally recognized that Prince Rupert would be the proper location for it.

For many years the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce had asked for such a sampling mill. Its advantages had been pointed out to the successive governments but it remained for a member who knew about mining and who represented a mining constituency to finally close the deal with the government and bring the plan to fruition. The people of the surrounding mining areas will be particularly pleased to hear of this excellent move.
