THE QUEBEC UPHEAVAL

The official Liberal party in the province of Quebec was swept from power in the elections yesterday and a new and more Liberal government headed by a nominal Conservative takes its place. The man who will now be premier, Maurice Duplessis, is said to be an excellent speaker and he is pledged to a program of reform which should come from a Liberal administration. He is backed by a number of young Liberals and the new administration which will be formed should be largely a government of young Liberals who tired of the Taschereau administration and all who were associated with it.

After nearly forty years of so-called Liberal administration the present upheaval has been somewhat of a rebellion against domination by big capitalists, similar to the Hepburn upheaval in Ontario a few years ago. As many of the dominating influences in that province have been English rather than French, there has been an anti-English sentiment growing up. With the church in many cases sympathetic to the new movement, many people have looked upon the political upheaval as one fanned by the Catholic Church.

What seems to be true is that there has been plenty of cause for a political upheaval in Quebec and that the change is undoubtedly for the better. The National Union Government will, it is hoped, prove to be a progressive one.

WILL DEFEND CANADA

President Roosevelt, in a political speech in New York State last week, promised that the United States would not only defend herself against any attack but would also defend her neighbors. This reference was specifically to Canada, for it followed reference to the boundary which "united" the two countries rather than divided them.

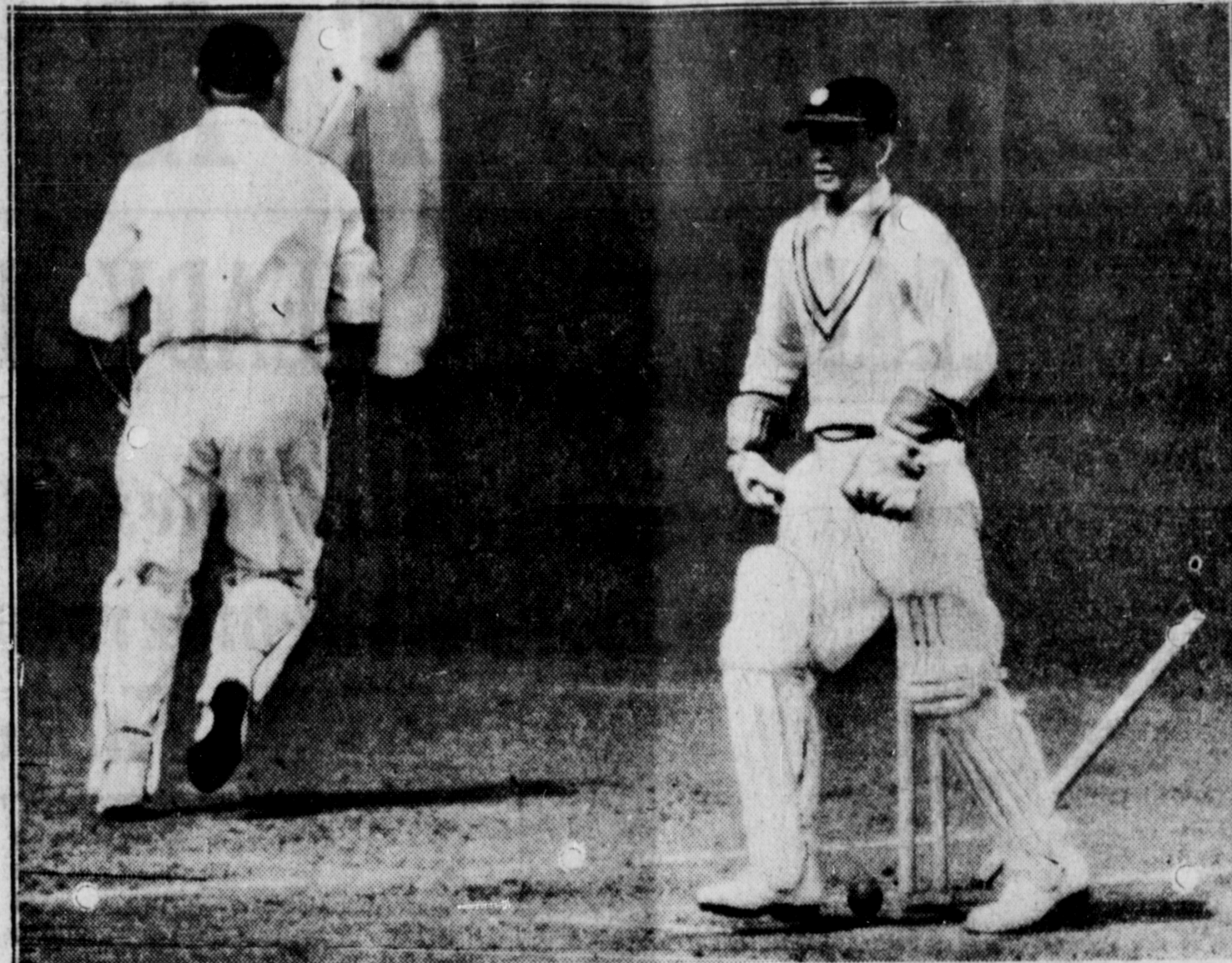

AMERICANS WIN SWIMS

Both Men and Women Triumph At Berlin—Some of Saturday's Results

BERLIN, Aug. 17.—The team standings of the three principal nations in men's swimming and diving competition at the Olympic Games on Saturday after the deciding finals in swims and diving championships were: United States, 83; Japan, 77; Hungary, 14. The women's team standings were: United States, 55; Holland, 52½; Germany, 25½.

Marshall Wayne of Miami won the Olympic platform diving championship with 11.58 points. Japan won both the 200 and 1500 metre titles. India won the field hockey championship, defeating Germany eight to one. While an unofficial count gave Germany an aggregate of 628 points and United States 451, the following table has been issued showing relative standing for all nations:

SHARKEY IS CONFIDENT

Louis Discreet and Non-Committal As Time Approaches for Important Heavyweight Battle Tonight

NEW YORK, Aug. 18:—Jack Sharkey, Boston's 33-year old glib and former world's heavyweight champion, was brimful of confidence today as the hour approached for his ten-round bout with Joe Louis at the Yankee Stadium tonight. Louis, on the other hand, maintained a discreet attitude and all that he would say was that he was in good condition and hoped to win.

Sharkey was talking about the possibility of a knock-out in the early rounds if the breaks came his way but assured all and sundry that he would win anyway.

Joe Louis weighs 200 pounds and Sharkey 195½ pounds. Louis is the betting favorite.

A crowd of 50,000 is expected by promoter Mike Jacobs with a gate of possibly \$200,000.

It was announced last night that, should it rain tonight, the bout would be postponed to Wednesday. It rained here yesterday.

SPORT CHAT

Bill Terry, manager of the New York Giants, who for two years now has seen his National League pennant hopes go glimmering in a late season slump, is hoping for a different ending this year and, judging from the recent performance of his team, would seem to have good reason to feel that way. During the past month the Giants have won twenty-five out of thirty-one games. Their machine continues to function in high perfect manner while the St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs, both more or less crippled, are showing a vacillating uncertainty.

Dizzy Dean on Sunday pitched his twentieth victory of the season. His volubility notwithstanding, it seems a reasonable speculation that, far from being at the top of the league, the Cardinals would not even have been thinking about the pennant this year had it not been for Dizzy's stellar hurling. It has been the one bright spot of the Cardinals this year. Whether or not it will carry the Red Birds through to the pennant, however, is a question that there is much difference of opinion about in baseball circles. The Giants' threat seems to be the one impressive factor these days.
