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# QUEBEC GOVERNMENT IS DEFEATED

## Liberal Administration Is Swept Out of Office In Yesterday's Polling

New Union Nationale Party Scores Smashing Victory, Winning Large Preponderance of Seats—Premier Personally Defeated—Duplessis Wins

QUEBEC, Aug. 18: (CP)—The Liberal government of Premier Adelard Godbout went down to a smashing five to one defeat at the hands of the Union Nationale, Conservative and insurgent Liberal coalition, in yesterday's provincial election. Premier Godbout was personally defeated in the riding of St. Jean by Joseph Bilodeau while Maurice Duplessis, leader of the Union Nationale, was elected in three ridings. The result marks the wiping out of the last vestige of the old Taschereau administration. An hour and a half after the polls closed last evening it was known that eighteen Union Nationale candidates had been elected while only three Liberals had been successful in three seats. Later reports showed the sweep to be continuing and the final standing this morning was 75 seats for the Union Nationale and 15 for the Liberal government.

In addition to Premier Godbout, four of the ten making up the cabinet which succeeded former Premier Taschereau's administration in June suffered personal defeat. Hon. T. D. Bouchard, minister of lands and forests; Hon. C. A. Bertrand, attorney general, and Hon. Frank Connors and Hon. Cleophas Bastian, ministers without portfolio, were the only members of the Godbout cabinet to be elected.

Former Conservatives are numerous in the new Union Nationale party but it will be the first time in Quebec's history that no Conservatives, as such, are represented in the Assembly.

## MANY ARE ADDICTED

BATHURST, N.B., Aug. 18: (CP)—Dr. C. J. Veniot, Liberal, was elected by acclamation today to represent Gloucester in the House of Commons at Ottawa, succeeding his father, the late Hon. P. J. Veniot, who died recently. There was no other name on the list when nominations closed.

## COLLAPSE OF PACT

Inspector Van Dyk also visited other points in the upper Stikine River as well as Tulsequah.

## Airplanes Standing by to Carry Members of Government Away As Fall of Madrid Appears Likely

General Opinion is That Capital of Spain Will be at Mercy of Rightist Rebels in Short Time Now

MADRID, Aug. 18: (CP)—Members of the Spanish Socialist government, fearing the fall of the capital into rightist rebel hands, today held three airliners ready for speedy flight at a moment's notice. Insurgents in Guadarrama Mountains north of Madrid are firmly established and have only to await reinforcements before opening a decisive attack on the capital. It is general opinion that the rebels will have Madrid at their mercy within ten days.

## TERRORISM AT JAFFA

Arabs in New Outbreak—Two Jewish Nurses Killed—Residents Ordered to Stay Indoors

JERUSALEM, Aug. 18: (CP)—Sequel to a new outbreak of Arab terrorism, British authorities threw a cordon of troops around Jaffa today and ordered all residents to remain in their homes until tomorrow. Two Jewish nurses were killed last night by Arab bullets.

## Funeral Is Held At Terrace For Harry Richmond

The late Harry Richmond, whose death is reported from Terrace, was formerly employed as a pump man by the Canadian National Railways until the time his health made it necessary for him to give up work. Born in Burleigh, England, April 9, 1879, Richmond is survived by a widow and family residing on Kalum Road. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at Terrace under the auspices of the Canadian Legion there, deceased having served in France during the Great War.

## BISHOP IS WELCOMED HIS BODY IS FOUND

Rt. Rev. J. R. Coudert Conducts Pontifical Mass—Reception In Evening

Rt. Rev. John R. Coudert O. M. I., co-adjutor bishop of the Roman Catholic Church for the Diocese of Northern British Columbia and Yukon, was welcomed to the headquarters parish in Prince Rupert on Sunday following his arrival at the end of last week from the Northwest Territories to assume his ecclesiastical duties here.

On Sunday morning at the Church of the Annunciation, Bishop Coudert conducted solemn pontifical mass before a large congregation. It was a choral service and others participating were the bishop, Rt. Rev. E. M. Bunoz O. M. I., Father Maurice Smith, the parish priest; Father Anthony Meulenberg of Stewart; Father J. Byrne Grant of Smithers, and Father Dreon of Hagwilget.

In the evening there was a reception at the School Hall to give the people of the parish opportunity to meet Bishop Coudert personally. The speakers, in addition to Bishop Coudert, included Bishop Bunoz, Father Smith and M. P. McCaffery.

Remains of "Beaver Jack" Thompkins, Believed Dead a Month, Recovered

The badly decomposed body of John Thompkins, better known as "Beaver Jack," an old age pensioner, was found on mud flats near Moore's Cove, south of Claxton Cannery, and has been brought to the city by the provincial police who are investigating. The body was lying partly in the water, depending on the stage of the tide, and the old man is believed to have been dead for at least a month.

Discovery of the remains was made by Hartley Bay Indians who reported the find to Sunnyside Cannery which advised the provincial police at 2:30 yesterday afternoon. The police boat P. M. L. 8 went out and returned with the remains last evening.

A post-mortem examination is to be held with a view to definitely establishing the actual cause of death. Thompkins, who, although somewhat of a recluse, was well known in the Skeena River district, was born near Windsor, Ontario, in 1858. He was formerly engaged in fishing and trapping.

## BEER HELPS IN FARMING

American Agriculturalists Profiting from Cereal Production

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18:—American farmers are profiting from production of cereal, according to an analysis compiled by the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Use of farm products in the manufacture of beer added more than thirty-six million dollars to their income during the fiscal year just closed, the figures showed. This was an increase of ninety-five percent over the "near beer" market of 1932.

## Seattle P. I. Is Still Held Idle

Four-Page Sheet, Published by Strikers, Makes its Appearance on Streets

SEATTLE, Aug. 18:—As pickets patrol the streets and prevent those who would from going to work in the plant, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer continues to be tied up by the strike of newsmen and editors. The strike was called late last week, having resulted from the dismissal of a photographer and a dramatic critic whom the management declared were inefficient but whom guild members claim were let out for guild activities.

A four-page sheet, the Guild Daily, has made its appearance on the streets. It had one full sporting news page, the rest of the issue consisting largely of stories and editorials attacking William Randolph Hearst, owner of the Post-Intelligencer.
