## On To The Peace

The Peace River outlet threatens to again become a live local issue. Page Rideout, who is in the city for the purpose of organizing a movement for the Prince Rupert route, is telling local people what it would mean to the farmers to have an outlet to the Pacific by way of this port. That is the great argument in favor of the scheme. It would also mean a great deal to Prince Rupert, if the railway is constructed.

If the Peace River outlet is to be built soon it will be one of the major operations in the country and will take care of thousands of unemployed, not only from this province but from all the prairies. It will prove of immediate benefit to the farmers, who today are taxed for living in a place with poor transportation facilities. The people there will not go on long with the handicaps at present imposed on them. Something will have to be done to relieve the situation soon.

## Open Up The North


The building of the western outlet to the Peace River country will be just one step in the opening up of the northern part of Canada. When the country was first opened, activities were practically confined to a narrow strip of country along the United States boundary. Canada on the map was a huge country but actually, so far as its inhabitants were concerned, it was just a long ribbon with frequent breaks in it.

Today the movement all over Canada is toward the north. One of the largest and most productive areas of the north is situated in what is known as the Peace River Block in British Columbia and the Peace River district of Alberta. This area is constantly being extended northward and the farther north it goes the better it is. Settlers driven out of the arid areas of Southern Saskatchewan can be taken care of in the Peace district but to take care of them properly a railway is necessary giving direct access to the Pacific. It is the next big project and it is for Canadians to see that it is not too long delayed.

## Artillery Battery

The dispatch received yesterday giving the news that a heavy artillery battery was being established at Prince Rupert is one of the indications that the defence of the port is receiving attention. When the big gun is here and the men are trained to handle it, we shall feel a little more safe in case of attack. It is to be hoped that the defence program will be followed up and provision made for a naval base.

brought to bear to make the Parliament of Canada realize the situation. He wanted to go back to the Peace River with the assurance that something would be done. He urged the formation of an organization that would keep working at this problem until action was taken.

## An Inspiration

Olof Hanson said he had taken great interest in this matter for years. He had supported a move of D. M. Kennedy, member for the Peace River, on four different occasions and had heard the question discussed from various points of view. He assured the gathering that he would do his utmost to keep it before the government. He suggested co-operation with a view to a campaign of publicity and then possibly the sending of a delegation to Ottawa in order to bring it more forcibly to the attention of the government.

Mr. Hanson said he was glad of the inspiration that was coming from the visit of Mr. Rideout.

Mr. Evitt explained that the matter had been urged by the Chamber of Commerce for a number of years and he was still as keen as ever for it. He felt it should be left to a committee of the Chamber to formulate a policy and drive it home.

Lee Gordon told of what the Junior Chamber had already done in the matter of the essay contest. He was ready to support any project likely to succeed.

Theo Collart said he believed it was time to again start the movement which had been interrupted by the depression. Now they must keep it going to the finish.

M. P. McCaffery said there was no doubt about the attitude of Prince Rupert toward this project. Mr. Rideout could feel assured that the people here would back him to the limit. He suggested that all work together through a central organization. In moving a vote of thanks to the visitor he made use of the expression "To the North Belongs the North."

S. E. Parker, in seconding the vote, concurred with the sentiments that had been generally expressed. He mentioned the ignorance in regard to the country of a great many people. It was necessary to educate the people of Canada in regard to Prince Rupert and the Peace River in order to succeed.

## ENFORCING BOOZE LAW

Greater Co-operation Between City Police and Government Recommended by Vancouver Commissioner

VANCOUVER, Dec. 17: (CP)—

The report of Hon. W. A. Macdonald, former justice of the Supreme Court of British Columbia on the charges of police laxity which had been made by W. A. Tucker, discharger police department accountant, recommends co-ordination between the police and the liquor control board in dealing with alleged bootlegging activities, easier procedure in the searching of suspected bootlegging premises, ready police access to Liquor Board files, discretionary power for the Lieutenant-Governor in council to revoke club incorporation upon representation of the chief of police, putting out of business of all slot machines and that active magistrates should not be members of the police commission.


