Twice since Spain's civil war broke out the British freight steamer Gibel Zerjon has been halted on the high seas by Spanish government warships. After the British battle cruiser H.M.S. Repulse had forced the Spanish vessel to allow the Giben Zerjon to continue on the first occasion, an apology was demanded and received from Spain. A second protest may be lodged by Britain.
