Local Endeavor Doing Much To Bring Stewart, Alice Arm Back Into Mining Picture

Like Prince Rupert people the residents of Portland Canal have always looked to the big companies to set them on the high road to prosperity and have ignored any suggestion that they might do things for themselves. Good properties have lain in the prospect stage for years because no big operating company showed any interest in them. The results being obtained at the Dunwell mine at Stewart, at the Dolly Varden at Alice Arm and in a smaller way at other properties are examples of local initiative that might well be followed by others.

One of the men who has done more perhaps than any other at Stewart to bring the camp into notice by local initiative is L. E. Davidson. His persistent effort to rehabilitate the Dunwell is not perhaps well known. His is the driving force that has made possible the operation of the mill and the shipping of concentrates to London, England, that has in a small way interested capital and whose continued efforts may continue to develop the district by getting other mines going. He is said to be taking an interest in the Lakeview which, according to street rumor in Stewart, has been showing up well.

William Dann is making a great effort with the United Empire. Recently the Mayflower has been leased to a syndicate and Sam Deschamp and partner have shipped eight tons of high grade ore from the Ontario mine on American Creek and plan to bring out another eight or nine tons valued at \$167 to the ton.

In Stewart there have been 200 claims recorded this year and assessment has been done on 500 with probably another hundred to hear from.

The outlook for Stewart district is said by mining men to be better for next year than at any previous time.

Alice Arm Ambitious

Alice Arm has some fine looking gold and silver properties and the mining men and prospectors there express the confidence that their camp will yet overtake Stewart and lead the Portland Canal area in production. They say that the classifying of Alice Arm as a strictly silver camp is all wrong. They have as much gold as silver and this they say will be proved in the future.

About four miles from Alice Arm is a molybdenum property in which interest is being taken just

now. On Hastings Arm there is a very good group of claims which would make a fine operation and would cost little to get going as it is right at tidewater. If any of these properties were near Bridge River they would be worth a lot of money but Alice Arm has not been a popular district for some years past. It has been a long wait but it is possible it may be the next district to attract attention.
