### NOW READY FOR SIEGE

Attack Upon Madrid Expected Momentarily-Rebels Are Approaching Outskirts

### Russia to Act

Great Britain Ready For "Act Of Mercy" in Rescuing Of Hostages

MADRID, Oct. 21:-Every emergency measure has now been invoked by the government authorities against the expected siege of Madrid by the Fascist rebels who were reported last night to be approaching the outskirts of the capital. Government heads admitted that the attack on the city might be expected within a few hours instead of days now. All loyal citizens are in readiness to defend the city.

Socialist troops, reinforced by civilian recruits, rushed from the city today and held insurgents at bay twenty miles from the capital, withstanding a heavy bombardment and then launching a counter attack. The insurgents beat off the government attack to recapture Illescas on the southern front and tighten their lines on the advance to the capi-

RUSSIA'S STAND FIRM MOSCOW, Oct. 21: (CP)—The Russian government has resolved not to yield another inch in delaying counter measures against alleged violations of neutrality by Fascist powers, informed sources said today. Only the immediate dispatch of munitions to the government forces can save Madrid, it is declared.

#### ROYAL NAVY STANDS BY

LONDON, Oct. 21: (CP)-The Royal Navy was ordered to stand by today for a "mission of mercy" to rescue thousands of hestages held by both sides in the Spanish civil war as the government today awaited replies from the foreign embassy at Madrid and Hendaye, France, to messages sent to the Madrid regime and the Fascist high command of fear of "wholesale massacre of hostages." The message declared that "His Majesty's government feels impelled to make an urgent appeal on humanitarian grounds to the authorities on both sides to an agreement for the exchange of all hostages."
