BRITAIN ISSUES WARNING TO SPAIN

John Bull Will Not Allow Interference With Legal Shipping

Both Sides in Civil War Are Cautioned—Paris Hears That Germany Has Sent Threatening Protest To Moscow.

LONDON, Aug. 21: (CP)—Great Britain today warned both sides in the Spanish civil war that she would tolerate no interference with legitimate activities of British shipping. If there should be illegal interference, British shipping would be protected. The British warning followed a similar one by Germany.

German Protest to Moscow
PARIS, Aug. 21: (CP)—Report that the German ambassador to Moscow had made a threatening protest to Russian Foreign Commissar Maxim Litvinoff against alleged Soviet interference in the Spanish insurrection was circulated tonight in diplomatic circles.

CAUSE IS UNCERTAIN

Origin of Big Fire in Vancouver Yesterday Morning Proves Mystery to Authorities

VANCOUVER, Aug. 21:—Fire Marshal H. D. Bowering, starting an investigation yesterday into the disastrous fire of the early morning which destroyed the Arena and a number of surrounding industrial buildings, indicated that the circumstances of the conflagration were very baffling and it was possible that the exact origin might never be ascertained. Mr. Bowering, however, was inclined to the belief that the cause was not incendiary.

Loss is now placed at about \$400,000. Had there been a wind there is no doubt but that the damage would have been much more widespread.

Across Canada With Dog Team

Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Carroll Of Ootsa Lake on Long Trip

LETHBRIDGE, Aug. 21: (CP)—Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Carroll, whose home is at Ootsa Lake in the Great Circle region of northern B.C., passed through here on their journey "across Canada by dog team" from Hazelton, B.C. to Halifax, N.S.

They hope to make the trip of approximately 3,100 miles within a year, travelling with a Yukon sleigh mounted on three motorcycle wheels and drawn by five sturdy huskies of the type which has served northerners for generations.

"We use dogs for the novelty of it and because we are used to handling them," Carroll said when asked of this unique manner of travel in the summer.

Highlight of their trip so far occurred when the dogs, all crossed from wolves and St. Bernards, broke into an open fight among themselves at Brooks, Alta.

COLORFUL CEREMONY

Vancouver is Busy with Lord Mayor of London—Delegates To Canadian Municipalities Convention Piqued

VANCOUVER, Aug. 21:—With dignified ceremonies in the ballroom of the Hotel Vancouver before a crowded assemblage, the Vancouver city council met under Mayor G. G. McGeer and made Sir Percy Vincent, Lord Mayor of London, the first freeman of this city. As the gift of the city of London, Mayor McGeer received from the Lord Mayor a large mace.

The day was also marked by continuation of the convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities. Some exception was taken to the "curt treatment" that the convention and its delegates had received from Mayor McGeer and members of the Vancouver city council. They had not even seen the face of the mayor and few of the Vancouver aldermen had put in an appearance. Mayor John Queen of Winnipeg said that the presence of visitors from London had been responsible for the "discourtesy" accorded the Canadian delegates.
