PORT BOU, Spain, Sept. 10: (CP)-That the new * that Italy and Germany were * Spanish government should be stripped of existing regulations governing individual liberty was advocated today by Antonio Moreno, general secretary of the Workers' Confederation. Moreno outlined a proposed "Iberian confederation of self-governing libertarian communes." There would be free love, abolition of private property, abolition of state, abolition of the principle of authority, nationalization of wealth and productive activity and confiscation of superfluous clothes and household goods.

Moreno asserted that the extremist National Confederation of Labor was dissatisfied with the timid policy of the Madrid government.

NOT HIGH

Figures Prepared at Victoria Show That Prince Rupert Compares Very Favorably

A compilation of basic tax rates in various municipalities of the province which has been prepared in Victoria shows that Prince Rupert compares favorably with other / cities of British Columbia. While the rate in some municipalities is lower than here, the general tendency seems to be higher. This may be a surprise to many as the genscral feeling has seemed to be that

taxes were excessively high here. According to figures which have been compiled, Prince Rupert pays an average of \$43.75 per \$500 of land and \$1500 of improvements (assessed valuations) excluding local improvements. Rossland has the highest rate of \$75 and Nanaimo the lowest, \$21.50. Victoria pays \$66.37; Vernon, \$50; Trail, \$46.25; North Vancouver, \$55.25; Nelson, \$43.75; Kamloops, \$50; Fernie, \$66.25 and Cranbrook, \$52.50. Among the cities having lower rates than Prince Rupert are Alberni, \$37.50; Chilliwack, \$42.50; Kelowna, \$43; New Westminster, \$28, and Prince George, \$32.50.

August Weather At Terrace About Same as Year Ago

TERRACE, Sept. 10:-Weather figures for Terrace for the month of August this year and last year show ittle difference. The hottest day in the past month was on August 3 when the mercury recorded 90 in the shade. Last year the highest temperature in August was 89.
