ANNUAL FLOWER SHOW

Next Monday the Horticultural Society is putting on its annual flower show. It is giving a good deal of time to the work of staging the show and asks the co-operation of all those who have gardens. Even the smallest exhibit will be acceptable.

It is not suggested from this that poor quality exhibits are asked. What is wanted is a good representative exhibit that will have educational value for local people and will be something to interest the five hundred tourists who are to be visiting the city that morning.

Plans have also been laid through the courtesy of the provincial government for a judge from Vancouver Island to visit the city and not only judge the exhibits at the show but also judge the garden and lawn competitions. When the judge comes around, those who have gardens are asked to show him around and give him every opportunity to see everything to advantage.

The splendid improvement of the city gardens in the past few years may be partly attributed to the efforts of the Horticultural Society in keeping the matter of beautifying constantly before the people. They hope that on this occasion the public will show their appreciation by co-operating to the fullest possible extent and making the annual show the best yet held.

CONSERVATIVE RECOVERY

One of the outstanding features of the Manitoba election in addition to the appearance of the Social Credit representatives equalling the number of C. C. F. members, was the first sign of a Conservative recovery in the election of sixteen members. This is a sign of what is likely to happen both east and west. It is simply history repeating itself. As a result of the depression the country became radical in its tendencies. Socialists and Communists gained considerable support and Liberals were returned in every recent election except in Alberta where Social Credit was adopted as a possible panacea. With improvement in conditions we find the country commencing to become more Conservative. Manitoba is leading the way and undoubtedly British Columbia will also elect a good Conservative representation at the next election, becoming again the official opposition in the House. This seems inevitable. Possibly when the Pattullo government has had its second term they may be replaced by an administration headed by Clive Planta or some other Conservative leader. At any rate we may look for Conservatives playing a much more important part in governmental affairs during the next few years than they do today.

WINNER BY KNOCK-OUT

Charlie Patsy of Hazelton Wins Bout at Carlisle from Don Mitchell of Lejac

CARLISLE CANNERY, Aug. 4.—Charlie Patsy of Hazelton, 148 pounds, was the winner of a scheduled six round boxing bout here over Don Mitchell of Lejac, 150 pounds, with a knockout in the third round. Patsy had the best of the argument in the first round when he landed a hard left hook that slowed Mitchell down just as the bell sounded. The boys opened up and fought hard in the second round and soon after the start of the third, Patsy delivered a hard left hook to the jaw and a right to the body which sent Mitchell down for the count of ten.

Patsy's seconds were Frank Gibson of Vancouver and Percy Kennedy of Vancoville. Mitchell's seconds were Bill Morris of Moricetown and Frank Joseph of Smithers. In the semi-wind-up Frank Gibson, 166 pounds, of Vancouver and Simon Angus, 160 pounds, of Kispiox fought a clean four round draw.

In the preliminary Pete Dick and Steve Garolin, 135-pounders, fought a three round draw. Dick Ito of Vancouver referred. Dick Latte of Hazelton promoted the card which drew a crowd of about 350 fans who were well satisfied with the gladiators.

TIME WAS EQUALLED

Jesse Owens Not Credited For New Olympic Sprint Record—Other Results Yesterday

BERLIN, Aug. 4: (CP)—Jesse Owens, "Black Bullet" of the United States, equalled the world and Olympic records by winning the 100-metre final at the Olympiad here yesterday in 10.3 seconds. Owens' time of 10.2 seconds in the preliminary heats Sunday will not be recognized as a world record.

Martin Isendard of Holland was third in the final. Ralph Metcalfe of United States having been second.

Lee Orr of Vancouver and Bruce Humber of Victoria were eliminated from the 100 metres in Sunday's trials.

Dr. Phil Edwards, who qualified for the 800-metre final, did so by placing third in the semi-final trial yesterday. Abbot Conway of Toronto ran fifth yesterday in the quarter final of the 800 metres and was eliminated.

Johnny Loaring of Windsor, Ont., finished second in his heat of the 400 metre hurdles and qualified but Jim Worrall of Toronto was eliminated in another heat.

Jeannette Dolson of Toronto and Aleem Meagher of Halifax were eliminated in the semi-finals of the women's 100 metres in which both finished fourth.

Joe Haley of Trail did not place in the high jump final.
