THE NEW BUILDING

It has been stated locally that the new federal building will be erected on the provincial government block in the centre of the city which is admirably suited for the purpose. The erection of the building, which it is understood is to be a substantial one, fireproof and large enough to house the Post Office, customs, Indian office, harbor master and marine and fisheries departments, will take! probably two years and in the meantime the present post office will be utilized. Everything points to the making of a thorough job that will be a credit to the government and to the city of Prince Rupert.

Another vote passed by the House of Commons was that of \$30,000 to the Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage for the purpose of making it a public cold storage plant which will be available for the keeping of meats, fruit and other district produce at the port. This will be of great advantage to the people of the interior who have been asking for some such convenience for a long time.
