PAIR ARE STILL IMPRISONED IN MINE

SLIGHT TAXATION REDUCTION ON LOCAL BUILDINGS

Rock Falls Delaying Deliverance of Men Entrapped in Shaft

TAX RATE FOR 1936 IS FIXED

Millage Unchanged From Last Year—Decreased Building Valuations Lower Imposts

Sitting in the capacity of a city council this morning, City Commissioner W. J. Alder set the tax rate of the city of Prince Rupert for the year 1936 at fifty mills on land and twenty-five percent of improvements.

The rate bylaw was put through its introductory readings as were also the estimates for the year which are somewhat lower than last year.

DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Inquiry Held by Coroner H. F. Glassey Into Shooting of Indian Woman in Atlin District

All the evidence in connection with the recent death of Mrs. George Johnson, an Indian woman, at Portage on Teslin Lake in the Atlin district, points conclusively to accidental death, according to telegraphic advices received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here.

SILVER PRICE IS ON UP-GRADE AGAIN

NEW YORK, April 21: (CP)—The price of imported bar silver advanced 3/4c to 45 3/4c per ounce on the New York metal market yesterday. It was the highest price since January 17. Silver circles attributed the rise in part to expansion of buying for Indian and speculative accounts in London last week.

DISPUTE IS UNSETTLED

SEATTLE, April 21: (CP)—The steamship Evelyn Berg of the Alaska Transportation Co., bound for Seattle from Southeastern Alaska points, went aground in heavy fog early Monday near Bella Bella but was refloated later under her own power.

He will be unable to go to the famous old school for 13 years, but it is common practice for parents to enter their sons for Britain's public schools soon after birth, owing to the long waiting lists.

Gives Resume of Victoria Session—Health Insurance Questions

TERRACE, April 21:—On Tuesday the Terrace Board of Trade held a meeting which was attended by a fair number of the members and their friends. E. T. Kenney M.L.A. was present and, during the evening, gave an interesting resume of the recent session at Victoria.

As there has not been much enthusiasm in Board of Trade affairs at Terrace during recent months, it has been decided not to hold regular meetings for the present but to call a meeting whenever there is any business worth while. Are Bearing up Well, However, and Barring Undue Delay, It is Hoped That They Will be Taken Out Alive—"Doing Fine," Says Dr. Robertson

MOOSE RIVER, N.B., April 21: (CP)—Frequent communication leads mining men attempting to rescue Dr. D. E. Robertson and Alfred Scadding from behind a cave-in in the Moose River gold mine, where they have been trapped for over a week, to believe that the two are "bearing up as well as could be expected," Minister of Mines Dwyer said today.

MURDERED HIS CHILD?

Police Charge Father in Death Of Two-Year Old Girl At Ashcroft

ASHCROFT, April 21: (CP)—Clarence Carrigan, aged 25, after being held by the police for questioning in connection with the death of his two-year old daughter, Shirley Edna, who died in Ashcroft hospital Saturday night from a blow on the head by a two by four scantling, appeared before Magistrate A. W. Jarvis on Monday charged with murder and was remanded for eight days.

The police state that Garrigan, under the influence of liquor, became enraged when he was unable to get into a pool hall which was closed. The child was with him. Seeing Garrigan swing the piece of scantling, W. John Nordstrom grappled with him after the child had been struck.

OIL WELL BLOWS IN

Two Men Injured by Gusher at Del Bonita, Alta.—Pressure Broke Steam Line

DEL BONITA, Alta., April 21: (CP)—Two California drillers, Pat Adams and Earl Boyd, suffered serious burns Sunday night when the Terminal oil well "blew in" under tremendous pressure and broke the steam line the men were using. Del Bonita is about fifty miles south of Lethbridge. The property is leased by the Nordon Co., a California outfit.

Collectors Keep Silver Dollars

Supply of Cartwheels Does Not Last Long in Edmonton

EDMONTON, April 21: (CP)—First supplies of 1936 vintage Canadian silver dollars which recently reached Edmonton banks have been entirely absorbed by collectors, officials report. Like the silver jubilee dollar of last year it is believed the new money will be kept as souvenirs and very little will be in circulation.

The new money is being sought by collectors in the belief it will be the last issue bearing the portrait of King George V. The 1937 issue is expected to mark King Edward VIII's coronation. The 1936 coin bears a new portrait of the late King, and was designed just prior to his death. The words "25th year" are lacking.

ACT TO BE ENFORCED

Provision Regarding Necessity Of Having Licenced Masters On Coast Is Relaxed

OTTAWA, April 21: (CP)—The new Canada Shipping Act, which was passed through Parliament two years ago but was never proclaimed, will come into force on August 1, it was stated last night by Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of marine.

Amendments to the Act which will be introduced this week include removal of the provision that licensed masters must be employed on ships over fifty tons operating along sea coasts. This had been objected to as working a hardship upon owners who operate their own craft.

Make Quiet Isle Bombing Station

Military Airplane Fields Replacing Old Farms on Thorney Island

THORNEY ISLAND, Eng., April 21: (CP)—Farms 800 years old are being abandoned on this small island, off the south coast of England, to make way for military airplane hangars and landing fields.

Three hundred farmers and laborers and their families are being transferred to the mainland. Their centuries-old cottages and manor houses are giving way to modern steel and concrete. Three bombing squadrons are to be stationed on the island.

THATCHERS HAIL SPRING SALISBURY, Eng. April 21: (CP)—Unmistakable sign of spring—thatchers are busy in the quiet villages of Wilts and Berks where every other roof is a thatch. With no machinery in the trade, the only patent lies in the nimble fingers of the workers.
