The remainder were still fighting amid the ruins and the scene was one of ghastly horror. The siege was continuing after eighteen hours and the remaining defenders were resisting stubbornly from the lower shambles under which the attackers were planning to place further mines.

Hundreds of government supporters were reported killed at Malaga, strategically important port on the Mediterranean not far from Gibraltar, fighting among themselves. It is believed that Malaga is near surrender. On the north coast Bilboa was bottled up completely by the in-

OLD SHIP

Built in Canada, Pioneer Steamer Had Many Firsts

QUEBEC, Sept 19: (CP)—Speed exploits of the Queen Mary have ecalled that the Royal William, named after William IV, the first ressel dependent largely on steam to cross the Atlantic from west to ast, was built in Quebec and aunched April 29, 1831. She was owed to Montreal and fitted with engines there.

The Royal William's first Atlantic crossing was made from Pictou. N.S., whence the vessel sailed Aug , 1833. The voyage nearly ended n disaster, the ship running into great storm off the coast of Newfoundland. Her foremast top was blown away and her starboard engines disabled.

The crew feared she would sink, but her captain, a Scotsman nemed John MacDougall, carried on, repairing the engines as best he could. Reaching Cowes, on the Isle of Wight, 19 days later, permanent repairs were made there and the vessel proceeded to Gravesend, arriving Sept. 11, after a total of 38 days on the trip.

The Royal William was constructed by James Goudie for the Quebec and Halifax Steam Navigation Company, owned by Samuel Cunard, formerly of Halifax, who founded the line of steamships bearing his name.

The Royal William was a truly historic vessel and has a list of records to her name. In addition to her epoch-making trip across the Atlantic she was the first steamship built in Canada and also inaugurated service by Vancouver-Foggy. calm; baro-| steamer from Quebec to Halifax. Sold to Portuguese

After her voyage across the At-Triple Island — Cloudy, fresh lantic the Royal William was sold to the Portuguese navy, becoming the first steam man-of-war. At a later date she was acquired by the Spanish navy and when she was used in the suppression of the Carlist rebellion under the name of Ysabel Segruda she was the first steam vessel from which a cannon was fired.
