BRITISH-JAPANESE CONFLICT

There is a conflict of interest going on between the British and Japanese in Shanghai which is tending to accentuate the differences already existing between them. Up to the present, the British have been supreme in the international concession and have practically controlled everything. They were there first and, as they carried out their duties with thoroughness, nobody interfered. Now the Japanese outnumber the British and threaten to outvote them in the elections. They consider the Japanese schools and other institutions do not receive enough municipal attention. While there is no present danger of trouble, the situation is a source of irritation.

SEEING STARS

Did the Magi who visited Bethlehem nearly two thousand years ago really see a star or a comet or was it an illusion? Astronomers are inclined to believe they did see a peculiar star, one of the new stars (Nova) which flash up suddenly, are bright for a time and then gradually fade. A little over a year ago, not long before Christmas, such a new star suddenly appeared. It grew in brightness rapidly but after reaching its maximum gradually faded from view.

BRITISH POST OFFICE

The British Post Office is becoming busy. Christmas mail this season was much larger than ever before and so were the telegrams handled. This Christmas Day the number of telegrams sent was just twice as great as on the previous Christmas Day. Fifty million dollars was withdrawn from the savings banks to cover the cost of Christmas purchases, this being five millions more than the previous year. Evidently they have reached a period of normal spending in that country.


