Synopsis of Land Act PRE-EMPTIONS

TACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by

tion, Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8.000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emptions carrying part time condi-tions of occupation are also granted. PURCHASE OR LEASE

Applications are received for purchase vacant and unreserved Crown lands, No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease
