

Canadian National Management To Be Changed Under New Bill Before House: Hungerford Head

OTTAWA, March 27: (CP)—A bill designed to transfer the management of the Canadian National Railways and affiliated companies from the present board of three trustees to a board of seven directors was introduced in the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of railways, and was given first reading. A number of changes are provided to give the government charter control of the system. The government will select the directors and name a chairman. The president, who would be the chief executive officer, would be chosen by the directors with the approval of the government.

While no announcement will be made until the bill becomes law, there have been frequent forecasts that S. J. Hungerford, the present president, would be both president and chairman. His appointment, it is believed, would be popular throughout the country and also within the system itself.
