### CHURCH IS COMPLETED

Fine New Edifice at Kitkatla Estimated to Have Cost \$20,000

KITKATLA, March 24:-- Work preparatory to the opening of the new church at Kitkatla is now finished and an opening celebration social was held last Friday.

In 1928 a fund was opened for the projected plan. Five years later clearing was commenced. The building of the new church was turned over to G. S. Fujimoto who completed it last fall. Approaches to the building site had still to be constructed. This was undertaken by the men of the village, Mathew Hill being the foreman. The women on such occasions served meals in the hall.

The cash expense, to date, isl \$10,394,26, according to Medric Nelson's report.

Miss Ruth Gladstone reports that the women donated \$750 worth of work while William Ridley, time-keeper, places the men's donated work at the value of \$9,000. In time, improvements will be added but, as it stands, the effort of the last six years is a decided credit to the village.
