ITEMS OF SPORT!

It is not all beer and skittles being a professional footballer in Britain. Receiving \$20 a week for a hour and a half's play, keeping oneself fit by daily attendance at the ground from ten till four, or taking long, invigorating walks into the country, with evenings spent at a theatre or music hall at someone else's expense, and visiting many strange towns without paying a penny for fare or refreshment en route, is only one side of the picture.

The other side is the way the professional footballer is fettered. He has to be a very clever individual indeed if he can observe all the extraordinary laws to which he is subject. Look at the fines which can be imposed upon him with impunity. Suppose a player incurs the wrath of a manager by turning up late. If that official so desires, he can impose a fine of five shillings, whereas in the case of an ordinary workman committing a similar offense the amount would probably be threepence.

Even if he objects, the leather-chaser has no legal redress. The rules of the football world decree that he shall not bring an action. One footballer once sued a London club for detaining a medal. Not only did the court hold that it had no jurisdiction, as the matter was one for settlement by the football association, but it mulcted the plaintiff in a couple of guineas costs. Should a footballer receive very drastic punishment for any offence, and the fact be reported in the newspapers, he may not bring an action for libel. Why? Simply because the body which controls him says so.

Until quite recently our leather-chaser could not demand a bonus of more than ten pounds, even if he were sold to another club for a hundred times that amount. For transgressing this law one player was suspended for life, and it was only after a long spell, during which time thousands of people signed a petition asking for the removal of the suspension that he was reinstated.

When there is an international match, the "pro," can be packed off to any part of the British Isles to play. The club to which he belongs may want his services very badly on that particular day; it matters not. Unless he can furnish a valid excuse for not playing in an international—few, it is true, would want to escape such an honor—he may be dealt with for "misconduct," and severely punished. And if his club supports his action, the club encounters the stormclouds too.

AN INDIAN MISSIONARY

Tells Prince Rupert Presbyterians How Greatly His Countrymen on Coast Need Missionary Work.

On the platform at the Empress Theatre during last night's Presbyterian Church service by the Rev. F. W. Kerr, were present Messrs. Wagner and Marsden, missionaries on their way to the coast of South-eastern Alaska, where for many years they have been laboring amongst the Indians.

Mr. Marsden himself an educated Indian of one of the Coast tribes, gave a short address at the close of Rev. F. W. Kerr's sermon on "The Sower." The native missionary dwelt with fervor on the power of the gospel to raise the Indians, his countrymen, from their wretched conditions, and went on to express an eloquent appeal to the white men to send them more missionary workers and to extend the field of the work to places where no Christian services were ever held. Places, which are situated between Prince Rupert and Vancouver, and which are passed regularly by the big passenger steamers whose lists are thronged with the names of Christian and church-attending Canadian men and women still unaware of the full needs of the Coast district for missionary enterprise.

"On behalf of my countrymen," said the missionary, "I appeal for them to you, who are developing this land so wonderfully. Open the doors of your schools, and of your churches, to us. Do not let us stand without the circle of your community. Let us share in the work of development, share the employment of your industries, and the advantages of your Christian civilization."

Rev. F. W. Kerr complimented Mr. Marsden on his appeal by saying that he only wished the members of the churches back east could hear and see the wonderful results of the Christian influence and education as were displayed by this native Indian missionary, and used so eloquently on behalf of his fellow countrymen.

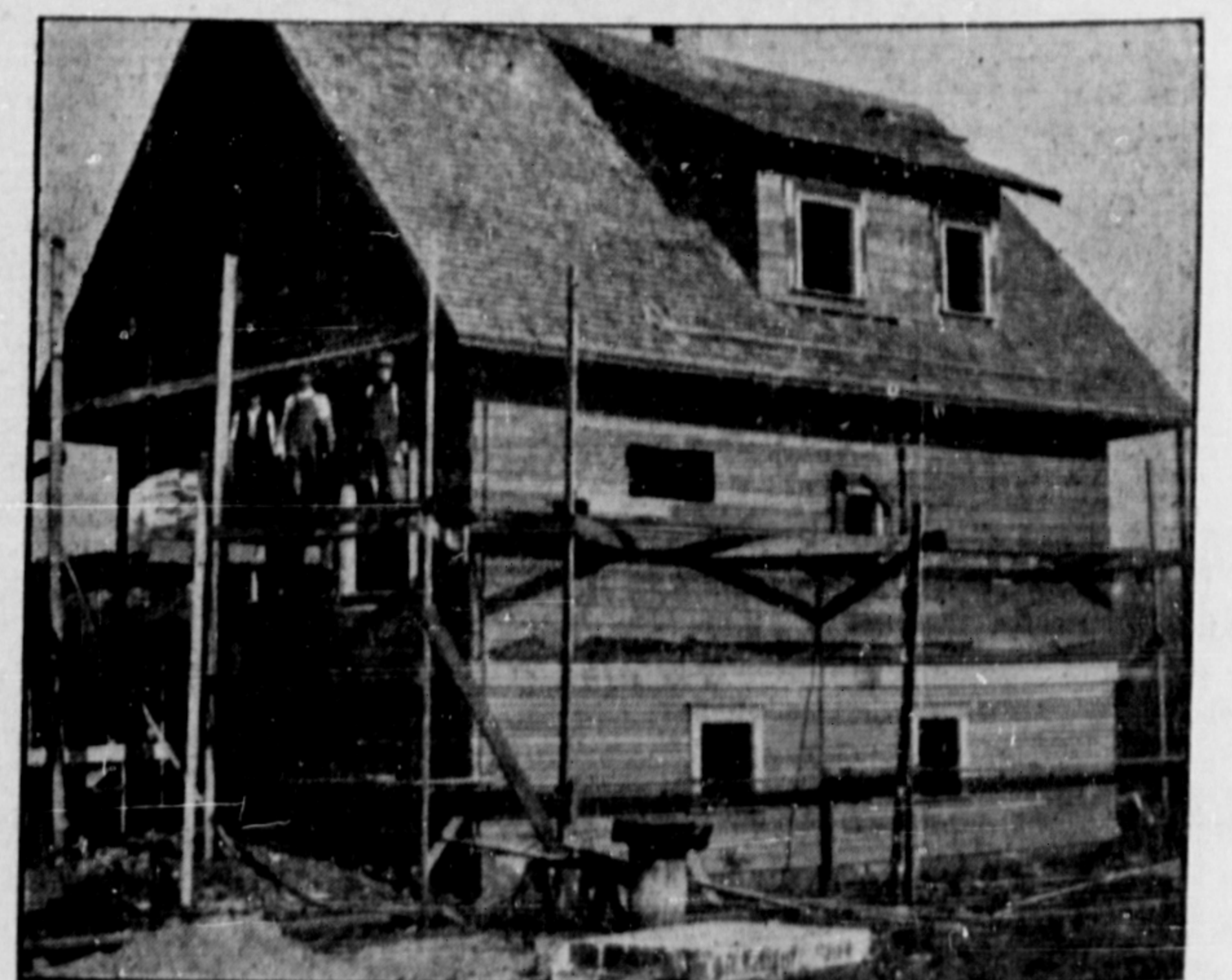
