

HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA
 Use six heaping teaspoons of Salada Black Tea in a pint of fresh boiling water. After six minutes strain liquid into two-quart container. While hot, add 1/4 cup of granulated sugar and the juice of 2 lemons. Stir well until sugar is dissolved, fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding cold water, otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped ice.
