TO MOP UP SEA FLOOR

Plans to Clean Hoary Millions From Bottom of Ocean

Strange Hunt

To Such Up Sunken Treasure From Scores of Gold-Strewn Wrecks

NEW YORK, Oct. 30: (AP)—A sea-going vacuum cleaner intended to scoop hidden fortunes from the ocean floor has been oiled for one of history's strangest hunts for sunken treasure.

In this great gadget men walk down stairs to the bottom of the sea. They will walk to a heavy-timbered hulk in the East River, timbers buried in the silt of 150 years—the hulk of the British frigate Hussar.

Deep in the Hussar's hold, under the captain's cabin (so read the Colonial Records) lie old iron chests bursting with millions in silver coins intended as pay for British soldiers during the Revolutionary War. The frigate foundered in a reef in 1780. Since that time he supposed millions have lured hunters almost ceaselessly—and always unsuccessfully.

Those millions fascinated Simon Lake, 70, Stratford, Conn., pioneer in submarine boat construction, for 52 years before he finally set to work a year or so ago to plan the salvage of the wrecked frigate. Today the jolly, white-haired inventor is about ready for his try at the treasure. His unique device has completed rigorous tests in Long Island Sound, and needs only last overhauling before going into action. He has a contract and the blessing of the U. S. government.

Romance played a large part in money in the venture, Lake declared: the romance of inventive triumph. "I think the treasure is there," he said, "but I'd reach the Hussar if there wasn't a penny aboard her. If I can succeed where others have failed, people will believe in my new invention." He was talking about the sea-going vacuum cleaner.

It was an odd-looking contraption, a barge with two long arms in front, and between the arms a small metal lozenge. The lozenge is submerged by filling ballast tanks with water, permitting men inside to step out and walk on the ocean floor. A long, telescopic tube links the barge on the water and the lozenge below. Men can walk down as easily as on a stairway. Air pressure in it can be increased to equal that of the water, so doors can be opened on the bottom without water coming in.

From this tiny submarine, three divers plan to go out in three hour relays to the Hussar's hidden hull, sweeping away 12 feet of silt with powerful water jets.

What happens after that depends on the Treasury Department. It will take a week, Lake said, to dynamite the docks and siphon out the hold with the vacuum cleaner. With three weeks more, he added—the ships could be emptied and raised to the surface intact for exhibition at the 1939 World's Fair in New York.

Pump Out British Silver
The treasure? That will end up in a sieve on the barge. All the silt in and around the Hussar will be pumped into this screen to catch the thousands of loose coins Lake expects to find.

How much the treasure totals no one knows. In American money it is variously estimated at \$1,800,000 to \$4,800,000. That the Hussar entered New York harbor loaded with silver there was no doubt. She carried sterling currency for the British soldiers, and her fleet-mate, the Mercury, carried more.

When the two frigates came in, the English were evacuating New York. The Hussar was ordered to take on the Mercury's silver, pick up 45 American prisoners and 14 carloads of specie from the paymaster's office, and make for the British fleet's protection at Newport.

The soldiers never got paid. The East River pilot was away from home when the Hussar set sail. His negro assistant rammed the frigate on Pot Rock in Hell Gate, and jumped overboard in terror.

The British sailed upstream alone. They dropped anchor at what is now 149th Street, and were carried on a reef by the strong ebb tide. It was mid-afternoon, the weather was calm, but most of the crew and all of the

Vancouver Wheat

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30: (CP)—Wheat was quoted at \$1.06 on the Vancouver market today.

Go Deep for Millions
But Lake's dreams for his sea-going vacuum cleaner go far beyond the Hussar's treasure, which is only "chicken feed" compared to the dazzling wealth the inventor believes he can bring up from other wrecks which dot the ocean floors of the world. His map of the world is pocked with more than 7,000 circles. Each circle a shipwreck with promise of buried precious cargo.

One circle marks the hulk of the most famous of all sea-buried treasures: the Tobermay galleon. One of the defeated Spanish armada, she sank at the entrance to the Sound of Mull in 1583 close to the town of Tobermay. For years divers have sought the loot she carried below decks. All they have got so far are a few Spanish swords.

Another circle, the Spanish armada's flagship, the Florencia which legend said held untold fortune as well as a woman who was to be Queen of England and the crown she was to wear.

Then there is the Spanish fleet which was speeding across the Atlantic with \$100,000,000 when Sir George Rooke sank it in Vigo Bay in 1702.

The Turkish-Egyptian fleet sunk by Sir Edward Codrington in the battle of Navarino, south of Greece in 1827, is another circle. Loaded with pay for the Turkish soldiers, she was sent to the bottom by British, Russian and French fleets with a reported \$50,000,000 aboard. A quarter-million was recovered and salvagers still work around the wreckage.

Another circle: The Lusitania, whose sinking off the coast of Ireland in 1915 brought the United States into the war. The "Arabic," with \$5,000,000 in its holds and the "Black Prince" lost in Balaklava Bay in 1854.

Bishop Rix was not enthused over the Aberhart schemes in Alberta. It divided the people into two camps.

A month spent in Ontario proved very interesting. The Bishop attended the Rotary Club at a meeting at Peterborough, the home of the Big Ben clock and Quaker Oats. He addressed the luncheon on the fisheries of Prince Rupert. He came home feeling that the potentialities of the whole Dominion were very great and in this he included Prince Rupert. He urged the people here to "Be strong and of good courage." If they continued to hold up their heads the reward would come. It did not require a large place in which to be happy. With its present population it was possible to live in such a way as to have all wants supplied. The people had good water, light, streets and entertainment. People always complained everywhere, no matter how much progress they made. The great thing was to be strong and of good courage.
