After losing the first game Saturday evening by a score of 12 to nil, Prince Rupert baseballers defeated Ketchikan by a score of 8 to 5 yesterday afternoon in the second of the international series and went ahead last evening by trouncing the visitors 6 to nothing in the third game.

First Game Marvin, for Ketchikan, gave a nice demonstration of pitching in the Saturday evening game. This boy has excellent control and struck out 14 men.

The Rupert players had an off night and could not do a thing. Nick Chenoski toed the slab for the locals pitching a good game but had very poor support.
