### WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Monster Whale Taken off Queen Charlotte Islands—Many Tourists Here This Morning—Aerial Angling Party Home.

One of the largest whales ever caught off the British Columbia coast was taken recently by the Consolidated Whaling Corporation's steamer Brown. The Brown was whaling out of Naden Harbor off the northern coast of the Queen Charlottes when an eighty-foot sulphur bottom whale weighing between eighty and ninety tons was harpooned.

The local branch of W. H. Malin Co. Ltd was represented at the annual picnic of the company's Old Guard Association held recently out of Vancouver to Selma Park aboard the Union Steamship Co.'s steamer Lady Cecilia.

Capt. Art Hook of the Ketchikan boat Nohosit, one of the vessels which was here over the week-end with the baseball team from the "First City," is a widely known and long experienced deep sea diver, having been identified with many undertakings of submarine adventure during his career. At Ketchikan he has a display of diving apparatus and submarine life which is quite notable.

There were 155 passengers mostly round trip tourists returning south, aboard the steamer Princess Louise which was in port from 3:30 to 5:30 Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Two passengers disembarked from the vessel at this port while four went south from here aboard her.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 10:15 last night from the south with a good-sized passenger list and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anyox and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow southbound.

Making her first voyage of the season on the Alaska tourist route, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rob-

ert, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and waypoints and sailed at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here next Sunday southbound. The vessel, which will make four Alaska cruises during the next couple of months, had a capacity list of 321 passengers including William Seiter, screen director of Shirley Temple; his wife, Marion Nixon, the popular actress; Mrs. Ty Cobb, wife of the great baseball star; Mr. and Mrs. J. Newberry, a Victoria honeymoon couple, and a large number of Chicago people.

Another vessel making her first Alaska voyage of the season was the C.P.R. steamer Princess Alice, Capt. Clifford Fenton, which arrived at 9 a.m. from Vancouver and sailed three hours later for Skagway whence she is due back here Saturday afternoon southbound. She also had a capacity list of passengers totalling 241 of whom 115 were round trippers. Four passengers left the Alice here while two went north aboard her.

The first party of Prince Rupert anglers ever to make the trip into Khtda Lake by aircraft, Dr. L. W. Kergin, F. A. MacCallum, R. G. Vandersluis, Capt. W. P. Armour and Allan Kergin, returned home last evening in Pilot Charles Elliott's Pacific Airways Junkers seaplane. They fished the upper lake and had good results. The flight took about half an hour each way whereas, by the ordinary means of transportation, it takes at least upwards of half a day each way.

With 155 passengers on board, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning from her first voyage of the season to Alaska and sails at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. Only one passenger disembarked here from the Prince Rupert.

The Indian Department's power cruiser Naskeena, with Constable Foster R.C.M.P. in charge, returned to port Saturday evening from a trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands with Indian Agent W. E. Collison on board. The Naskeena had been away since last Wednesday. Mr. Collison was making the trip to the Islands of which agency he is in charge pending the appointment of an agent to succeed James Gilett, who was recently transferred to Bella Coola. Massett and Skidegate were visited by Mr. Collison.

### Timely Recipes

#### STRAWBERRY JELLY

4 cups (2 lbs.) juice.  
7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar.  
1 bottle fruit pectin.

Use only fully ripened berries. Crush thoroughly and drip through jelly bag. Do not drip overnight as uncooked juice ferments quickly. Measure juice and sugar into large saucepan, stir, and bring to boil. At once add pectin, stirring constantly, and then bring again to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove from fire, let stand 1 minute, skim, pour quickly. Cover hot jelly with film of hot paraffin; when jelly is cold, cover with 1/8 inch of hot paraffin on sides. Requires about 3 quart glasses. Makes about 11 eight-ounce glasses. A few weeks later along come the raspberries and this recipe may be used again for raspberry jelly.
