ing.

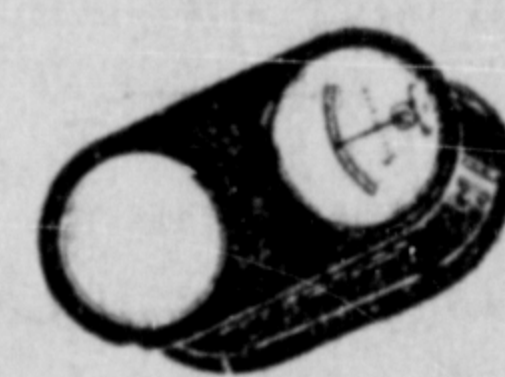
Shortbread

One cup butter, 1/2 cup fruit sug-
ar, 2 1/2 cups flour, pinch of salt.
Cream butter thoroughly and add
sugar and salt, gradually. Add flour
and work mixture with hands un-
til dough can be shaped. Turn out
on lightly floured board and knead
until mixture cracks. Roll to about
1/4-inch thickness. Cut into fancy
shapes. Bake in a slow oven (300 to
325 degrees F.) until very slightly
browned (about 30 minutes). Gar-
nish, if desired, with green or red
cherries.
