Forest products made up the most important of the exports accounting for thirty-four percent. Fishing and whaling accounted for thirty-two percent, mining, eight percent; agriculture, five percent, and other sundry industries twenty-one percent of the exports. About 900,000 tons of fish was caught yearly. Herring were caught all along the coast, and lobster and cod fishing were also very impor-

The population was less than three million people, less than one percent being of non-Norwegian origin. In the north were 30,000 people of Mongolian origin who are very skilled in the rearing of reindeer herds.

Since the year 1536 when the Lutheran religion was introduced into Norway, education had made steady progress. There were splendid primary, secondary and technical schools, as well as various institutions of higher learning and a uni-


