# WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Dr. L. W. Kergin and party returned on the Aledor last night from a successful week-end angling trip to Khtada Lake.

Prices for halibut sagged somewhat on the Seattle Fish Exchange yesterday but are still at a highly satisfactory level. Two boats sold catches totalling 71,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Thor, 36,000 pounds, Whiz, 12c and 11c; Yakutat, 35,000 pounds, Sebastian-Stuart, 11<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>c and 11c. The Albatross and Repeat had catches of sablefish and mixed cod for which 4c and 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>c was paid.

Delayed on her final voyage of the season on the Alaska route, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Neddin, arrived at 12:45 noon today from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed later in the afternoon for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due to return here Monday southbound. The vessel had on board a large list of passengers consisting largely of tourists with thirty persons going east by train.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship Norco arrived in port at noon today with one thousand cases of canned salmon for transshipment east over Canadian National Railways.

# FORGOTTEN DOCUMENTS

During Reconstruction of P. E. I. Provincial Building Workmen Discover Archives

CHARLOTTETON, P.E.I., Aug. 26: (CP)—Rummaging around in the attic of Prince Edward Island's historic legislative building, W. F. P. Bradley shook Island credos by discovering a chest full of documents throwing light on divorces of the past in a province now without a divorce law.

For months Mr. Bradley has been cleaning out odd cubby holes in the grey stone building, collecting valuable government papers laden with dust, relics, forgotten proclamations more than a century old.

Each new discovery pulled from a crevice, unearthed from a pile of dog-eared papers, has illumined a new version of the past, and although the records have not been fully sorted or studied, there have been disclosures to change the general conception of Island history.

In one document written in cursive, prefaced by "His Excellency's Command," Sir Charles Augustus Fitzroy, Governor in 1839, gives the official order to take the power of divorce from the assembly and place it in the jurisdiction of the law courts. It is addressed to Hon. Edward James Jarvis, chief justice by the forerunner of the present speaker of the British House of Commons.

"Interesting rare bits in these old divorce documents," commented Mr. Bradley who guards his finds with the possessive touch of an archivist. He pointed to one petition "To the Worshipful and Honorable the Court of Marriage and Divorce," with an early 19th century date.

### Frequently Maltreated

The libellant, alleged her husband, a butcher, did frequently maltreat and dreadfully beat and bruise the libellant with his fists and with sticks so that her life was rendered a perfect burden to her, and which treatment broke the spirit of the libellant and thus caused her to fly to liquor and drown her sorrows by taking intoxicating drafts.

Besides the government records there were interesting relics found in the attic—cannon balls, Indian axes, huge keys. There was one copy of the proceedings of the legislative council abolished in 1893. There were the appointments of the lieutenant governors, huge proclamations bearing the seal of Victoria.

Probably the most prized find was a proclamation from the government of Prince Edward Island in 1830 addressed to William IV regretting the death of George IV. It bore the signature of every member of the legislature.

Another record told of the appointment of the first Queen's council. The Legislature protested the appointment. The legal profession sent a formal petition to England but Victoria Regina stood firm and allowed the measure to pass. The second appointee, Joseph Hensley, resigned rather than cause a further rumpus. All this was written into the records, discovered after all these years, Mr. Bradley said.

There were customs books of the island of St. John, Prince Edward Island's original name, copy of an act published to establish the academy of Charlottetown, forerunner of the present Prince of Wales College.

# Many Visitors To the Museum

Two Nice Donations Received Towards the Funds From Out Of Town—Native Food Samples To be Secured

During the month ending yesterday there were 479 paid admissions to the Prince Rupert museum which, added to donations and other monies received during the month, brought the total takings of the museum up to \$79.03.

The tourist season is now very nearly at an end and the paid admissions to the museum will probably be very small during the autumn months. The donations included \$10 from the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. Ltd. and \$10 from Chris Spencer of Vancouver.

On the invitation of the museum board, Rev. W. H. Pearce attended the meeting and suggested that specimens of native foods be collected in time for next season, as so many visitors wanted to know what the natives on the coast ate prior to the coming of the white people. The foods include cockles, clams, seaweed, fish eggs, and the inner bark of the hemlock and the root of one of the large ferns. Rev. W. E. Collison volunteered to try to secure a number of these.

Among the articles donated to the collection of exhibits during the month was an Indian chest warmer made of rabbit's paws, a jar of preserved soapberries, and a packet of dried soapberries sent from Hazelton by Mrs. Cox. A bullet shown imbedded in a tree was donated by John Viereck and recently identified from the Hyde collection as a mourner's hood. David Jones donated an Indian baby sucking stone.

Rev. Cannon Rushbrook presided at the meeting and there were also present Dr. Neal Carter, acting secretary, Rev. W. E. Collison, C. G. Ham and H. F. Pullen. All the other members of the board were out of town.

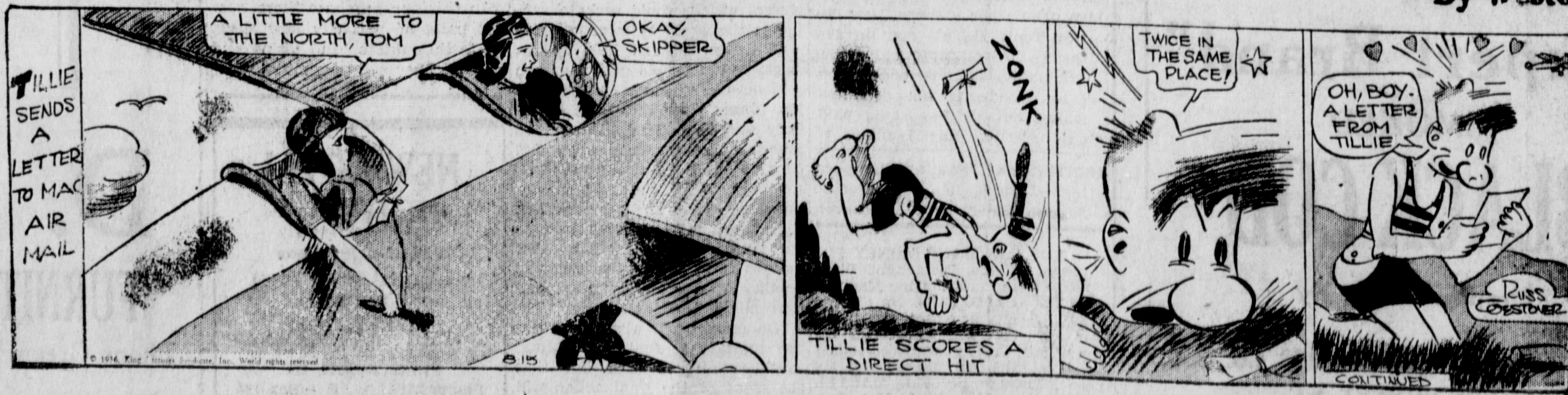
