## KEEN RACE IN BOWLING

## DON BROWN CHAMPION

Defeats Charlie Balagno in City Billiard Final

The city billiard championship was concluded last evening at the Canadian Legion clubrooms when Don Brown won from Charlie Balagno by 92 points, the final score being: Brown, 500; Balagno, 408. Brown thus won the city championship with three victories.

While there were some very uninteresting periods, the game had its bright points. Balagno led 108 to 82, 204 to 172 and at half-way 253 to 230. Brown got ahead 298 to 297 but Balagno was ahead 301 to 298. From then on Brown played more confidently and gradually increased his lead to win as stated.

Brown's best breaks were 34 and 30, Balagno's best 29, 28 and 21. Jack Allan was official referee and George Dawes marker.

The handsome trophy donated by the Canadian Legion was then presented to M. Brown by President W. M. Brown who spoke suitably. Don Brown acknowledged the presentation but regretted that there was not greater interest shown in the game of billiards in the city.

After he had congratulated Don Brown on winning the championship this year, Neil Cameron, former champion, issued a challenge for a game. This will be for 1,000 points. The match should arouse much interest and details will be announced as soon as they are arranged. It will be played at the Legion clubrooms at an early date.
