**Native Treatment At Celebration**

**Chamber of Commerce Hears of Steps Being Taken to Prevent Objectionable Practices—Other Business**

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night heard from F. A. MacCallum, the representative of the Chamber on the Coronation celebration committee, a plea for better treatment of the natives who attend that important event. He stated that a delegation of natives had protested against their treatment on previous occasions and had been assured that steps would be taken this year to see that justice was done. The average native was a law-abiding person and members of each group would be asked to see that their members did not get out of hand and to police themselves as far as possible. In this they would have the cooperation of the city police.

It was reported that the result of a recent vote showed eighteen had favored regular evening dinners, sixteen had asked for dinners alternately with regular evening meetings and six preferred continuing as in the past. Dinner meetings would be held, it was announced, in the Knox Hotel, the Commodore Cafe and the Boston Cafe in regular order. Next month it was planned to dine at the Knox.

Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of transport, through Olof Hanson, wrote encouragingly in regard to the aids to navigation asked by the Chamber for many years past. Mr. Howe also discouraged the idea of giving special privileges to local boats carrying passengers out of Prince Rupert and suggesting that owners of boats should make them conform with the regulations.

The freight rates committee consisting of G. W. Nickerson, C. C. Mills, and Thomas McMeekin reported in favor of a resolution coming from Smithers Board of Trade asking for lower express rates on shipments of farm produce such as was granted from competitive points. It was decided before taking action to await the reply of the Express Department to the Smithers people. The principle of the resolution was approved.

**Will Entertain Vancouver Men Visiting City**

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its dinner meeting last night, received from the entertainment committee an outline of what it was planned to do in the way of entertaining the members of the Vancouver Board of Trade when they visit the city on June 11. As many members as possible will meet the boat on arrival at 9 a.m. and during the morning the visitors will be given an opportunity of meeting their friends in the city and possibly lunching with them.

In the afternoon at 2:30 a trip around the harbor will be arranged in one of the Armour Salvage Company's boats going as far as Metlakatla. Those who prefer will be taken to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage plant at Seal Cove by car and also out the highway. At 5:30 entertainment will be provided at the Prince Rupert Club and at 7 o'clock the officers and executive of the local chamber will be guests of the visitors at dinner aboard the boat.

Entertainment arrangements are in the hands of the committee consisting of C. V. Eviitt, Frank Dibb, Philip Ray and Stan Parker.

**Wallie's House Now Show-Place**

**Visitors to Baltimore For Price May See Mrs. Simpson's Old Home**

BALTIMORE, May 8: (CP)—The one-time Baltimore home of Mrs. Wallis Simpson, fiancée of the Duke of Windsor, has been opened to the public at 50 cents a look.

There are five guides on hand to shepherd the curious. They are provided by "Two Hundred and Twelve East Biddle Street, Inc.," a slightly mysterious corporation that now has the destinies of the old house in hand. Just what individuals compose the corporation evidently is to be a secret.

The first thing the cash customers see is a hallway, very much like any other hallway, glistening with fresh paint. On the left is the parlor. Some Victorian bric-a-brac sits about. On the walls are enlargements, framed, of Mrs. Simpson, surrounded by friends and relatives. Also there are portraits of the former King Edward VIII in various regalia, and Mrs. Simpson in her court presentation gown.

On the second floor is a model of Fort Belvedere and grounds, the former King's private residence near London. A large front room is adorned with cartoons and contains copies of many different newspapers of the constitutional crisis period. The piece de resistance is saved for the last. It is roped off, so the customer may only peer from the doorways. A big double bed backs up to the east wall. It isn't actually the bed Mrs. Simpson slept in, although the guide says a number of things in the house were there during her occupancy.

His was a real leadership of which today, through sheer personal acumen, there was no questioning. In addition to being the strongest man in his party, he was a tried and proven administrator of outstanding ability. He had made the science of government a lifetime work. The Conservative and C. C. F. leaders were admittedly outstanding medical men but were they competent to carry on such an important business as the governing of the province of British Columbia? It was a notorious fact that professional men were usually poor in business. Too often it was thought that there was nothing to it but to go to Victoria with a majority following and take over the reins of office.

In seconding the nomination of Mr. Pattullo, Victor Basso-Bert declared that the Premier had been a credit to British Columbia and an outstanding figure in provincial affairs. His policies were outstanding in Canada. He believed in the redistribution of wealth and the bringing about of true democracy. Ultimately the rest of Canada would come to accept the Pattullo point of view which was that of the greatest good for the greatest number.

Nominations were moved closed

by T. W. Brown and W. M. Brown, the chair declaring Mr. Pattullo the unanimous choice.

 Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, wished to associate himself with the unanimous nomination of Mr. Pattullo. He told of co-operation that he had received from Mr. Pattullo. One notable instance was the making available of the site on which the new federal building here was to be erected.

Prince Rupert should make sure of the Premier's re-election here. Should there be such a thing as his being defeated here, he would most certainly be offered another seat for there was no doubt that the government would be returned and he would still be Premier. What might his attitude be to Prince Rupert should he be defeated here? After all, he had ably represented this riding for twenty years.

W. M. Brown, Ambrose Reid and others spoke upon the advisability of effective organization and an energetic campaign.

L. W. Patmore was appointed campaign manager by the convention. Committee rooms are being opened at the corner of Second Avenue and Sixth Street in the Westenhaver Block with Malcolm McLeod in charge.
