Thousands Slain in Heavy Battles In Spanish Civil War—Results Still Indecisive

AVILA, Spain, Feb. 27: (CP)-In connection with the assertion that the general government offensive on the Madrid front had collapsed, the insurgent command in the Spanish civil war asserts that an entire battalion of Madrid militiamen was annihilated with machine guns and hand grenades. The number of soldiers in the slaughter is not estimated but the insurgents ay that battalions usually numper between six hundred and a thousand.
