PUBLIC QUESTIONS

H. R. MacMillan, one of Canada's leading industrialists, in an address to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce recently, which address is now distributed in pamphlet form, deals with a number of questions of trade and commerce which are of great interest to us all.

One of these questions is that of cost of production. He shows that the increasing cost of living, as a result of controlled marketing, tends to discourage production by making the cost too high for the purchasers to pay. As the bulk of the products of British Columbia are exported and sold in competition with cheaper labor, the question of keeping up the export of products and thus continuing our prosperity, is a vital one.

Again he mentions the question of defense of our trade routes and shows that, as long as we are dependent on our export business, we must be in a position to protect our shipping as well as defend our own shores.

One of the commodities in which Mr. McMillan is interested is that of fish, for he is president of the B. C. Packers. He shows that British Columbia fish has to compete with similar fish packed by cheap Japanese labor. This fish is sold in the same market as British Columbia fish. Japanese people engaged in fish packing receive about nine dollars a month in Japan. The result is that

B. C. fish is ousted from all but protected markets. We all believe in high wages and we hope British Columbia will be in a position to pay them but, the moment wages get so high that the products cannot compete with other countries, there is an immediate lessening of employment. We respect the efforts but there must be a reasonableness in these efforts else we shall find the market demoralized and all the efforts of all the marketing boards in the world will not keep the prices up.
