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THE POSITIVE PROGRESSIVE ATTITUDE

In a period such as Prince Rupert has been through the people are apt to adopt a less aggressive attitude and become critical of everything. This is not an attitude that makes for progress. Even if the city has not made the progress it was expected it would during the past ten years, it is still a very much alive centre with the very best of prospects. It will, undoubtedly, become a great port and the more we all put on a bold front and adopt a progressive attitude instead of a petty, nagging attitude, the more likely are we to make good.

In spite of a certain amount of worrying over what people were saying it was found this week that only a dozen people disapproved the movement to try to induce a pulp mill to start in the city. It was a splendid exhibition of unity of purpose and gives hope that in all our future movements we shall be able to stick together and present a united front. The wild talk of a half a dozen kickers was shown to have little influence on the whole community. People with a stake in the city still keep the progressive attitude. It is the attitude that wins success.

PUBLIC QUESTIONS

H. R. MacMillan, one of Canada's leading industrialists, in an address to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce recently, which address is now distributed in pamphlet form, deals with a number of questions of trade and commerce which are of great interest to us all.

One of these questions is that of cost of production. He shows that the increasing cost of living, as a result of controlled marketing, tends to discourage production by making the cost too high for the purchasers to pay. As the bulk of the products of British Columbia are exported and sold in competition with cheaper labor, the question of keeping up the export of products and thus continuing our prosperity, is a vital one.

Again he mentions the question of defense of our trade routes and shows that, as long as we are dependent on our export business, we must be in a position to protect our shipping as well as defend our own shores.

One of the commodities in which Mr. MacMillan is interested is that of fish, for he is president of the B. C. Packers. He shows that British Columbia fish has to compete with similar fish packed by cheap Japanese labor. This fish is sold in the same market as British Columbia fish. Japanese people engaged in fish packing receive about nine dollars a month in Japan. The result is that B. C. fish is ousted from all but protected markets.

We all believe in high wages and we hope British Columbia will be in a position to pay them but, the moment wages get so high that the products cannot compete with other countries, there is an immediate lessening of employment. We respect the efforts but there must be a reasonableness in these efforts else we shall find the market demoralized and all the efforts of all the marketing boards in the world will not keep the prices up.

PASSING OF STATESMAN

1908 Gaspé again sent him back to parliament.

Mr. Lemieux was chosen for the portfolio of Postmaster-General by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1906 and he continued in this post until 1911. In those years he played a conspicuous part in the development of Canada's postal service and was recognized as one of the strong men of the ministry. In 1907 he was the special envoy from Canada to Japan when the Asiatic immigration troubles were smoothed out. In 1910 he represented Canada at the inauguration of the parliament of the Union of South Africa. In 1911 he was made Minister of Marine and Fisheries, but shortly afterwards the Laurier government went down to defeat on the reciprocity issue. Mr. Lemieux met his first reverse in Gaspé, but was elected in Rouville. In the general election of 1917 he was elected for the constituency of Gaspé and also for Maisonneuve. After that he ran only for Gaspé, and won the elections there in 1921, 1925, and 1926.

Was Named Speaker

When the Liberal party led by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King came into power in 1921 Mr. Lemieux was offered a portfolio, but declined. He was elected Speaker of the Commons at the session which followed—the first session of the fourteenth parliament.

In 1924 the Liberal government offered him the Lieutenant-Governorship of the province of Quebec, and he later had an opportunity to become Minister of Justice in Mr. King's cabinet. He declined both of these positions. He frequently told friends that he loved most his positions as head of the House of Commons. The fifteenth parliament in January, 1926, again selected him as Speaker, and when the commons assembled after the general election that year, they once more made him their presiding officer.

Byron Nelson Is Belmont Winner

Defeats Henry Pickard in Classic American Golf Tournament

BELMONT, Mass., Sept. 29:—Byron Nelson won the Belmont golf tournament yesterday five and four over Henry Pickard. Nelson receives a prize of \$3000 and Pickard \$2000.

Many honors came to Mr. Lemieux from outside his own country. The French government made him a knight of the Legion of Honour in 1906 in recognition of his services in promoting closer and better relations between Canada and that nation. Later he was made an officer of the same order. In July, 1927, he was elected member of l'Institut de France, succeeding Cardinal Mercier.

He was a member of the Eight Club, the National Liberal Club of London, England, and the Circle Inter-Allie of Paris, France. The Vatican conferred on this devoted son of the Church the honor of Knight Commander of St. Gregory the Great in 1924.

In Canada he was elected President of the Royal Society in 1918.

CUBS WIN OVER REDS

Boston-New York Double-Header Washed Out Yesterday—Giants Still Have Four Game Lead

CINCINNATI, Sept. 29: (CP)—The Chicago Cubs blanked the Cincinnati Reds here yesterday to pare to four full games the National League leadership of the New York Giants whose scheduled double-header with the Boston Bees at the Polo Grounds was washed out as was also another scheduled double bill at Philadelphia between the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Phils. The Giants now need but two more wins to clinch the pennant, regardless of what the Cubs do. At Pittsburgh the Pirates defeated the St. Louis Cardinals yesterday to oust them from third place.

In the American League the New York Yankees split a double-header with the Senators at Washington and their American League leadership was reduced to thirteen-and-a-half games over Detroit Tigers who were downing the Browns at St. Louis.
