VANCOUVER, Sept. 29: (CP)—Over one hundred guests were routed from their beds early today when fire of unknown origin swept through the basement and beer parlors of the Belmont Hotel on Granville Street. The manager and night clerk, with aid of other employees, Australia's "Flying Physician" ran through the hallways of the six storey building,

giving the alarm. Two alarms were sounded before firemen brought the flames under control. Damage is tentatively estimated at \$50,000.

The two nations were united as a bulwark of peace in Europe. Mussolini said there was "no secret intention behind my trip" to visit the German Chancellor.
