Broadcasting is a national business. It should be carried out either directly by the Radio Corporation of Canada or under close supervision by them and should be designed to give the best possible service to the audience it is designed to reach. We need a service that will reach every mining camp, logging camp and railway town so that all may learn to appreciate what it means to live in Canada and be a Canadian.

Recently a few local men put up a brave fight against being compelled to pay a radio licence when they received so little benefit from the Canadian government in the way of programs or keeping the air free from distur- Herman bance. One of these objections has now been removed and, doubtless, others will follow in due course. No one objects to paying a licence fee if they get something for their money. Evidently the new governing body of radio in Canada is realizing the situation and making an effort to improve conditions.
