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Japanese Attack Cay By Land, Sea and Air-Death Toll Mounts







Mass evacuation of forengners residing in shell-torn Shanghai, is underway by British and United States authorities, as fighting between Chinese and Japanese became general along a 15-mile front encircling the city of 3,500,000 persons. The toll which leaped 1000 in the first day of actual fighting is steadily mounting as Japanese warships pour shells into the city and Japanese soldiers and marines invade the metropolis. An idea of the power of a modern high explosive shell may be gathered from the upper photograph when one struck a Chinese train as it left the north station in Shanghai. One shell did the damage shown. Japanese forces are pouring shells into city in allday bombardments. Leader of the Japanese troops in Northern China where the Japanese invasion preceded the fighting at Shanghai is Colonel Renjo Mutaguchi shown in the centre photograph with members of his staff as he directed operations near Peiping. The scene shown in the lower photograph is one such as are common during the Japanese invasion of Shanghai. It is being re-enacted in a hundred spots about the native district of the cosmopolitan city. Japanese marines are shown behind their barricades in the Chapei section where fighting is taking place.
