NEW WAREHOUSE FOR WATERFRONT
Messrs. W. McMillan & Co., Wholesale Grocers, to Build Next to Piery Morris' Premises.

Another large warehouse is planned for the waterfront wholesale district of Prince Rupert. A two-storey building with spacious accommodation and construction similar to that of the Kelly-Douglas and Piery Morris buildings is to be erected on the space next to the Piery Morris building, to the east. Messrs. W. J. McMillan & Co., wholesale grocers, gave instructions to W. L. Barker, architect, to prepare plans, and this morning contracts were let for the building. Carpenter work will be done by Messrs. Mitchell, Currie & Watt. Roofing and sheet metal sheathing of the entire building is in the hands of Messrs. Smith & Mallett. The plans provide for a building opening on the wharf side, served with temporary hand elevators until power is available and suitable for the class of goods handled. Premises opening onto First Avenue are contemplated for erection later. They will, it is understood, be of concrete.

SCHOONER DAMAGED.
Accident at Wharfside to Princess Victoria—Fouled Kingsway and Carried Away Mast.

Considerable damage was done on Sunday morning to the schooner Princess Victoria, which was moored near to the trawler Kingsway at the new Davis wharf. The schooner broke away from her moorings, and fouled the trawler, smashing in her own bulwarks and carrying away her mainmast.

The Princess Victoria is a 66-foot boat, and was built at Masset in 1905 by Captain Stanley for sealing. In this work, however, she was never used, but plied between Prince Rupert and Masset with passengers and freight. Bought recently by F. Clark of this city, she has just been sold to the Pacoli Fish and Fertilizer Co., owners of the Kingsway, to extend their fishing business. The Princess Victoria was sunk the same night at the Cottage City, off Helmencken Island, but was successfully salvaged.

Mail South Tonight.
Some time after 6 p. m. the G.T.P. steamship Prince John will pull out on her fall trip for overhauling at Vancouver. She will carry passengers and mail south. Mail closes at 6 p. m. at the post office. The Prince Albert takes up the work of the John until the John returns to her run.
